NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to Officers in the Navy and Persons entitled to Naval Half-pay or Pensions, or their Executors or Administrators residing in his Majesty's Dominions, that from and after the 1st day of January 1817, they may receive the same by Bills of Exchange upon the Commissioners of the Navy, payable at three days sight, if they shall be desirous of doing so, instead of receiving the same by Remittance Bills, on signifying such desire by letter to the Treasurer of the Navy, and transmitting, with such letter the usual affidavit or certificate of the day of the death of the deceased: on receipt of which the form of the bill properly filled up, as directed by the Act, will be sent to the party applying, when the Half-pay or Pensions are in course of payment, and no other can be accepted.
