To his Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble and dutiful Address of his Majesty's loyal subjects, the Ministers of the Presbytery of Lanark.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Ministers of the Presbytery of Lanark, beg leave to approach your Royal Highness, to express our abhorrence and detestation of the wicked and daring attack which was lately made upon your Royal Highness, in returning from the performance of one of the high duties of your office, and humbly to offer our congratulations on your escape from that outrageous attack.

We feel deep regret that such a crime should have been, even for one moment, harboured in a Briton's bosom, and we sincerely congratulate your Royal Highness, that he by whom Princes rule, hath saved you from the blow of the assassin, and our beloved country from one of the foulest stains which could have blotted her history.

We embrace also the present opportunity of declaring our sincere attachment to your Royal Highness, and your illustrious house, and our firm resolution to maintain at all times inviolate the person of our Prince, and the admirable constitution under which we have the happiness to live.

While demagogues, therefore, endeavour to unsettle the minds of the people, and men under the specious mask of reform would revolutionize our happy land, we beg leave to assure your Royal Highness, that we shall endeavour to impress yet more and more upon the minds of those committed to our pastoral care, the duty which the master we serve demands of his followers, "to render unto Cæsar the things that are Cæsar's, and unto God the things that are God's," in the full confidence, that that wisdom which guided us amidst the perils of war, and that energy which brought about a secure and honourable peace, shall still continue to consult and promote the honour, the happiness, the best in-

terests of that kingdom, which stands so pre-eminent among the nations of the world.

To his Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The humble and dutiful Address of the Provost, Bailies, and Counsellors of the Royal Burgh of Sanquhar.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, his Majesty's loyal subjects, the Provost, Bailies, and Counsellors of the Royal Burgh of Sanquhar, beg leave with profound respect to approach your Royal Highness with our cordial congratulations on the failure of the treasonable attempt lately made by an infuriated mob against the sacred person of your Royal Highness, in returning from opening the present session of Parliament, and to express our utmost abhorrence and detestation with which we view the late diabolical designs, and our sorrow that any miscreants should be found among our countrymen so far deluded and depraved as to attempt the perpetration of a crime fraught with dangerous and most alarming consequences to these kingdoms.

We beg leave to assure your Royal Highness of our unshaken attachment and fidelity to his Majesty and to your Royal Highness, and that we reflect with gratitude on the wise and merciful administration of the constitution, which hath prevailed under the Princes of the illustrious family of Brunswick, and of our steady resolution to assist in defending that noble, free, and venerable constitution under which we and our fathers have long enjoyed many inestimable blessings, and the protection of our lives, religion, and property. We dwell with exultation on the grandeur and dignity to which the firm, honourable, and prudent administration of your Royal Highness hath exalted our country among other

nations, and justly rendered us the envy and admiration of the world.

We are far from being unmindful of the present sufferings of the country, in part occasioned by an unfruitful season, and resulting in a greater degree from the great exertions during the late war, and our return to a state of peace; but when we recollect the frightful despotism which held in chains the nations of Europe, whose liberation has been achieved by the exertions of this country,—a despotism which threatened his Majesty's realms with slavery, and the destruction of every thing dear and valuable, we do not estimate these sufferings, arising from our resistance to an implacable foe, as bearing any comparison with the advantages derived from the conduct and bravery of our fleets and armies, acting under the wise policy adhered to in the councils of his Majesty and your Royal Highness.

We deprecate the malignant and selfish conduct of these restless, assuming, and unprincipled demagogues, who, by fomenting discontent among the lower classes at the present crisis, tend to estrange their affections from your Royal Highness and your illustrious house, and to produce these riots and outrages which have unfortunately disturbed the peace of various parts of the country.

The humble Address of the Provost, Magistrates, Town-Council, and Deacons of the Incorporations of Lanark.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, his Majesty's ever dutiful and loyal subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, Town-Council, and Deacons of the Incorporations of the Royal Burgh of Lanark, in Council assembled, beg leave to express to your Royal Highness our abhorrence of the



wicked and treasonable attack made upon your royal and sacred person, on your returning from the House of Parliament, after discharging one of your most important public duties.

We deeply lament this flagrant outrage; and in unison with the sentiment of the loyal and patriotic part of the subjects of these kingdoms, offer to your Royal Highness our heartfelt congratulations on your happy and providential escape, in which the hand of Providence has been evidently manifested; and we implore, for your Royal Highness and this kingdom, a continuance of the same mighty protection.

In approaching your Royal Highness we are compelled to express our serious apprehension; that this great crime has not been the deed of one solitary assassin, but has had its source in a wicked and rebellious spirit, which is actively seeking to seduce the distressed, but good and loyal subjects, of your revered father, from their allegiance, and from their veneration for those laws, and that form of government, which for ages have been the glory of Britons, have at all times upheld their country in the first scale of nations, and have, at a late important crisis, rendered it the prop and stay of social order.

We therefore trust such measures will be adopted as shall restrain the disaffected, shield your royal person, and insure the tranquillity and safety of the realm; and that upon this particular occasion the loyalty and patriotism of the subjects of the United Kingdom will be so eminently conspicuous and universally manifested, as not only to bring the seduced to a proper sense of their duty, but give to your Royal Highness the fullest confidence in the affection and attachment of the general part of the subjects for your royal person.
