To his Royal Highness **George PRINCE REGENT** of the United Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, &c. &c.

WE, his Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Magistrates and Town-Council of the Burgh of Campbeltown, for ourselves and in behalf of the whole community; beg leave most humbly to approach your Royal Highness with sentiments of unfeigned loyalty and attachment to your person and government, to express our detestation and abhorrence of the outrage offered to your Royal Highness on your return from the Houses of Parliament upon the 28th ultimo; and to assure your Royal Highness, that we feel the deepest indignation against the miscreant and his abettors that were guilty of such an atrocious and unmerited attack, and of the indignity offered to your royal person, as Prince Regent of the realm.

We humbly and most earnestly pray, that your Royal Highness may be pleased to direct such speedy and effectual measures to be pursued as may be the means of discovering and bringing such detested traitors to condign punishment, thereby to warn the misguided, and to remove the fears of his Majesty's loyal subjects, so materially interested in the safety of your Royal Highness's person, and the welfare and happiness of the empire in general: to which end we pray that God may long preserve your Royal Highness to reign over a loyal, free, and happy people.

The humble Address of the Provost, Magistrates, and Council of the Ancient Burgh of Ayr.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, his Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Provost, Magistrates, and Council of his Ancient Burgh of Ayr, in Council assembled, beg leave most humbly to approach your Royal Highness with our expressions of attachment to the person of your Royal Highness, and to those principles which seated your royal family upon the throne.

We regard with horror and detestation the late atrocious attempt upon the sacred person of your Royal Highness, on your return from opening the session of the Imperial Parliament, and in the exercise of the royal functions, in the name and on behalf of his Majesty; and the more so upon a Prince who has so much endeared himself to all his Majesty's loyal subjects, by many acts of kindness and munificence, by his forbearance and moderation on many occasions, and by the attachment he has so often shewn to their rights and liberties.

Whilst we have a deep sense of the difficulties and privations under which many of the different classes of the community at present labour, we are not aware that the late numerous field meetings and harangues are at all calculated to relieve them; and cannot but express our abhorrence at the wicked and flagitious conduct of designing men, who delude the people by absurd and pernicious doctrines, under specious pretences, which have led to riot and confusion in different parts of the empire, and must, in place of bettering the condition of the lower orders, add to their distress, and endanger the constitution.

And whilst we thus express our indignation and hatred at such acts of outrage, and such enormities, too appalling to contemplate, we feel it to be our imperious duty to the throne and to the country, to pledge ourselves to support and maintain our invaluable constitution, as by law established, against every attempt of visionary theorists that may be made against it.
