PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

It is ordered by his Royal Highness the Prince Regent in Council, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, that the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Monday the 25th day of this instant August, be further prorogued to Monday the 3d day of November next.

WAR-OFFICE.—August 6, 1817.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to approve of the 24th regiment of foot being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have heretofore been granted to the regiment, the words "Talavera," "Fuentes d'Honor," "Pyrennees," and "Orthes," in commemoration of the distinguished services of the late 2d battalion of that regiment in the battle of Talavera, on the 27th and 28th July 1809; at Fuentes d'Honor, on 3d May 1811; in the Pyrennees, in the month of June 1813, and at Orthes, in the month of February 1814.

20th—Lieut. Honourable John Massey, from the half-pay of the 1st dragoons, to be Lieutenant, vice Honourable George William Massey, who exchanges, receiving the difference.

3d Regiment of Foot—Ensign John H. Browne, from the half-pay of the 2d Greek light infantry, to be Ensign, vice Justin de Courcy, who exchanges.

93d—Lieut. Daniel O'Meara, from the 5th West India regiment, to be Lieutenant, vice David McPherson, who retires upon the half-pay of the 5th West India regiment. Serjeant-Major James Crombie, to be Quarter-Master, vice Mackay, who is placed on the retired list on full pay.

104th—Agnew Champain, gent. to be Ensign, by purchase, vice Pigott, promoted.

Royal York Rangers—Lieutenant-Colonel William Smelt, from the 103d foot, to be Lieutenant-Colonel, vice Matthew Stewart, who retires upon the half-pay of the 103d foot.

STAFF—Major William Lewis Herries, Permanent Assistant-Quarter-Master-General, to be Deputy Quarter-Master-General to the forces serving in the Mediterranean, with the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel in the army, vice Lieutenant-Colonel Ryves. Commissions all dated July 31, 1817.
