QUEEN'S PALACE—TUESDAY, APRIL 6, 1818.

This evening at eight o'clock, the solemnity of the marriage of her Royal Highness the Princess Elizabeth, daughter of his Majesty, with his Serene Highness Frederick Joseph Louis Charles Augustus, Landgrave and Hereditary Prince of Hesse Hom- bourg, Prince of Hersfeld, Count of Catzenellen- bogen, Dietz, Ziegenhayn, Nidda Hanau Schaum- burg, Isenburg, and Budingon, &c. &c. was per- formed in the Grand Saloon at the Queen's Palace, by his Grace the Archbishop of Carterbury, in the presence of her Majesty the Queen, their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of York, Clarence, Kent, and Gloucester; her Royal Highness Princess Augusta Sophia, her Royal Highness the Duchess of Gloucester, her Royal Highness the Duchess of York, her Royal Highness the Princess Sophia of Gloucester, the Great Officers of State, the Amba- sadors and Ministers from Foreign States, the Offi- cers of the Household of her Majesty the Queen, the Officers of the Household of his Royal High- ness the Prince Regent, and of the younger branches of the royal family, assisting at the ceremony.

At the conclusion of the marriage service the regi- stry of the marriage was attested with the usual formalities.

The Great Officers of State, Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other persons of distinction present, then paid their compliments on the occasion; after which her Majesty the Queen, the bride and bride- groom, with the rest of the royal family, retired to her Majesty's private apartments.

The bride and bridegroom soon after left the Queen's Palace for his Royal Highness the Prince Regent's Lodge, Windsor Park.

Immediately after the conclusion of the marriage the Park and Tower guns were fired, and the even- ing concluded with other public demonstrations of joy in the metropolis.
