WIDOW'S PENSIONS.

ADMIRALTY-OFFICE, 10th April 1818.

HIS ROYAL HIGHNESS the PRINCE REGENT having been graciously pleased to authorize the Court of Assistants for managing the charity for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy, to grant the usual Pensions to the Widows of Officers who have died before the expiration of twelve months from the time of their Marriage, in such cases as it shall appear to them, upon minute investigation, that their Marriage did not take place under any circumstances implying fraud, or any improper intention of obtaining the pension.

And his Royal Highness having been also pleased to direct that any Widow of a Naval Officer, entitled to, or receiving a pension, who may MARRY again, on or after the 1st January 1818, and may subsequently become a WIDOW, shall, during the period of her second Widowhood, be allowed the pension to which she was entitled prior to her RE-MARRIAGE, provided her circumstances are within the limitation of the Charity.

This is to give notice thereof, and that Copies of the New Regulations of the Charity, and Forms of the Affidavit to be in future used by Sea Officers' Widows, may be obtained by letter addressed to the Secretary of the Admiralty, or on personal application at the Admiralty-Office, and at the offices of the Resident Commissioners of the Navy, at the several dock-yards.

And no affidavit on the OLD FORM for the next Quarter will be admitted.
