His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to approve of the 16th regiment of light dragoons being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have heretofore been granted to the regiment, the words "Talavera," "Fuentes d'Honor," "Salamanca," "Vittoria," and "Nive," in commemoration of the distinguished services of the regiment at the battle of Talavera, in the month of July 1809; at Fuentes d'Honor, in the month of May 1811; at the battle of Salamanca, on the 22d July 1812; at Vittoria, on 21st of June 1813; and in the operations connected with the passage of the Nive, on the 9th, 10th, and 11th December 1813.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to approve of the 59th regiment of foot being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have heretofore been granted to the regiment, the words "Vittoria," "St. Sebastian," and "Nive," in commemoration of the services of the late 2d battalion of the regiment at the battle of Vittoria, on 21st June 1813; at St. Sebastian, in the month of September 1813; and in the operations connected with the passage of the Nive, on the 9th, 10th, and 11th December 1813.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to approve of the 71st regiment of foot being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have heretofore been granted to the regiment, the words "Rolia," "Vimiera," "Fuentes d'Honor," "Vittoria," "Pyrennees," "Nive," and "Orthes," in commemoration of the distinguished services of the regiment at the battle of Rolia, on the 17th August 1808; at Vimiera, on 21st August 1808; at Fuentes d'Honor, in the month of May 1811; at Vittoria, on 21st June 1813; in the Pyrennees, in the month of July 1813; in the operations connected with the passage of the Nive, on the 9th, 10th, and 11th December 1813; and at Orthes, in the month of February 1814.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to approve of the 79th regiment of foot being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have heretofore been granted to the regiment, the words "Fuentes d'Honor," "Salamanca," "Pyrennees," "Nivelle," "Nive," and "Toulouse," in commemoration of the distinguished services of the regiment at Fuentes d'Honor, in the month of May 1811; at the battle of Salamanca, on 22d July 1812; in the Pyrennees, in July 1813; at Nivelle, in November 1813; in the operations connected with the passage of the Nive, on the 9th, 10th, and 11th December 1813; and in the attack of the position covering Toulouse, on the 10th April 1814.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to approve of the Royal Staff Corps being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have heretofore been granted to the regiment, the word "Egypt," in commemoration of the services of the two companies of that corps which were employed in Egypt, and formed a part of the line of battle in the action at Alexandria, on the 21st March 1801.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to approve of the 1st West India regiment being permitted to bear on its colours and appointments, in addition to any other badges or devices which may have heretofore been granted to the regiment, the words "Martinique" and "Guadeloupe," in commemoration of the distinguished gallantry displayed by the regiment in the descent upon the Island of Martinique, in the month of February 1809; and in the attack upon the Island of Guadeloupe, in the month of February 1810.
