REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE PROGRESS OF THE DEPARTMENT

1954-1955

The following is a summary of the work done in the Department of Physics during the year 1954-1955. The work was carried out by the faculty and students of the Department and was supported by the National Science Foundation, the Office of Naval Research, and the University of Chicago.
