WHITEHALL—MARCH 30, 1819.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, to constitute and appoint the Right Honourable George Earl of Morton, Knight of the Most Ancient Order of the Thistle, to be his Majesty's Commissioner to the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

ACT OF PARLIAMENT.

UPSET FEU-DUTIES REDUCED.

ADJOURNED ROUP OF BUILDING GROUND AT INVERLEITH.

There will be feued, by Public Auction, upon Wednesday the 21st day of April 1819, within the Royal Exchange Coffeehouse, Edinburgh, at one o'clock afternoon, in virtue of an Act of Parliament, at the reduced rate of 30l. per English acre of yearly feu-duty,

ELEVEN LOTS OF LAND fronting the Queensferry road, immediately to the west of Stockbridge, being part of the lands and estate of Inverleith. Each lot measures about 1 rood 5 poles 8 yards of ground English measure, and one dwelling-house only is to be built upon each lot. By the terms of the charters, all sorts of nuisance are prohibited; and the feu-duties will be taken bound to adhere to a general plan.

The lands are beyond the bounds of police, and are free from the taxes of the city of Edinburgh. There is plenty of water on the ground, and a sufficient fall for drains. The feu-duties at which the lots are to be exposed are moderate, and the amount of the city taxes which will be saved upon each house will be nearly equal to the whole feu-duty. From the extent of land in each lot, each house will have a garden sufficient for the supply of a family.
