Extract of a Dispatch from the Right Honourable George Henry Rose his Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Berlin, to Viscount Castlereagh, K. G. dated Hanover, March 26, 1819.—Received April 6.

HER Royal Highness the Duchess of Cambridge was safely delivered of a male child, at ten minutes past two o'clock this morning, at Cambridge-House, in this city. His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence, the Earl of Mayo, and myself attended her Royal Highness's confinement, and have signed a formal declaration to the above effect.

Her Royal Highness and her child have past the night quite well. He appears to be healthy and well grown.

Extract of a Dispatch from the Right Honourable George Henry Rose, his Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at the Court of Berlin, to Viscount Castlereagh, K. G. dated Hanover, March 27, 1819.—Received April 6.

IT is my duty to apprise your Lordship, that her Royal Highness the Duchess of Clarence was delivered of a female child this morning, at ten minutes past seven o'clock; that the child was born alive, and was baptized at nine o'clock this morning, according to the rites of the Church of England, by the names of Charlotte-Augusta-Louisa; and that it expired at one o'clock this afternoon, at the Fürstenhof, the residence of his Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence in this city, where it was born.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, the Earl of Mayo, and myself attended her Royal Highness's confinement, and have signed a formal declaration to the above effect.

CALTON AND BRIDGETON BREAD SOCIETY.
