WESTMINSTER—DECEMBER 23, 1819.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of his Majesty, for declaring his Majesty's Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act to prevent delay in the administration of justice, in cases of misdemeanour.

An act to amend an act of the last session of parliament, to make further provision for the regulation of cotton-mills and factories, and for the preservation of the health of young persons employed therein.

DECEMBER 24, 1819.

An act for more effectually preventing seditious meetings and assemblies, to continue in force until the end of the session of Parliament next after five years from the passing of the act.

An act to amend an act, of the 42d year of the reign of his present Majesty, for regulating the trial of controverted elections or returns of Members to serve in the United Parliament for Ireland.
