WESTMINSTER—July 8, 1820.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read, and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An act for raising the sum of twenty-nine millions by Exchequer bills, for the service of the year 1820.

An act to permit the importation of coffee from any foreign colony or plantation in America into the port of Bridgetown in Barbadoes.

An act to amend and continue, until the 31st day of December 1823, several laws relating to the encouragement of the Greenland whale fisheries, to the allowing vessels employed in the said fisheries to complete their full number of men at certain ports.

An act for further continuing, until the 1st day of January 1826, so much of an act, passed in 56th year of his late Majesty, as permits subjects of his late Majesty, the King of the Netherlands to import and export certain articles into and from the colonies of Demerara, Berbice, and Essequibo, in ships not of the built of the dominions of his said Majesty.

An act to increase the power of Magistrates in the appointment of special constables.

An act for fixing the rates of subsistence to be paid to innkeepers and others on quartering soldiers.

An act for altering and amending several acts for making and maintaining the Forth and Clyde Navigation.

An act for taking down the old bridge, and for erecting and maintaining a new bridge, over the River Earn, in the parish of Dupparney and shire of Perth.

An act for more effectually repairing and maintaining several roads, in the counties of Stirling, Dumbarton, Lanark, and Perth.

An act for more effectually repairing and maintaining certain roads in the counties of Dumfries and Roxburgh. And to several English roads, &c. acts, and twenty-six private Bills.
