WHITEHALL—APRIL 9, 1821.

The King has been pleased to appoint Vice Admiral Sir Richard Goodwin Keats, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath, to be Master of his Majesty's Hospital at Greenwich, in the county of Kent, and also one of the Commissioners of the Customs thereon, in the room of Admiral Sir John Colpoys, deceased.

WESTMINSTER—APRIL 6, 1821.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act to permit the removal of certain goods from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain, by cocket, certificate, letpass, or transire.

An act to continue until the 5th day of April 1823, several acts of his late Majesty for reducing the duties payable on horses used for the purposes therein mentioned.

An act to explain and amend an act of the Parliament of Ireland, passed in the seventh year of the reign of his Majesty King George the Second, for better regulating the payment of fees of Attornies and Solicitors, and other purposes therein mentioned.

An act to repeal an act made in the Parliament of Ireland, in the 28th year of the reign of Queen Elizabeth, against witchcraft and sorcery.

An act to indemnify persons who shall give evidence before the Lords Spiritual and Temporal on the bill to exclude the Borough of Grampond, in the county of Cornwall, from sending Burgesses to serve in Parliament; and to enable the

borough of Leeds, in the county of York, to send two Burgesses to serve in Parliament in lieu thereof.

An act for more effectually converting into money the statute labour of the county of Sutherland, and for more effectually making and maintaining roads therein to which the statute labour is applicable, and increasing the amount of bridge money leviable within the same.

And to several English road, &c. acts, and eight private bills.

The old post-road between Dunbar and Berwick runs along the southern boundary of the property. There are upon Wester Press a large house and offices, formerly used as an Inn, and upon Easter Press a suitable farm steading, with a thrashing-mill by water. A great part of the lands is at present in grass. Entry to the houses, (with the exception of part of the steading on Easter Press), and to 376 acres in grass, at the term of Whitsunday next, and to the arable land at the separation of the crop from the ground.
