WESTMINSTER—MAY 28, 1821.

It is day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*, and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act for removing doubts as to the continuance of the hereditary revenue in Scotland.

An act to repeal the duties of customs on the importation into Great Britain of certain sorts of wood and timber, and certain drawbacks or allowances in respect of such duties, and to grant other duties and drawbacks in lieu thereof.

An act to defray the charge of the pay, clothing, and contingent expence of the disembodied militia in Great Britain, and to grant allowances in certain cases to subaltern officers, adjutants, quartermasters, surgeons, surgeons mates, and serjeant-majors of militia, until the 25th day of March 1822.

An act to defray, until the 25th day of June 1822, the charge of the pay and clothing of the militia of Ireland, and for making allowances to officers and quartermasters of the said militia during peace.

An act for establishing regulations respecting certain parts of the proceedings in the Court of Session, and in the Court of Commissioners for Teinds, and respecting the duties, qualifications, and emoluments of certain clerks and other officers of the said Courts.

An act for the better regulation of the Courts of Admiralty in Scotland, and of certain proceedings in the Court of Session, connected therewith.

An act for giving greater facility in the prosecution and abatement of nuisances arising from furnaces used and in the working of steam-engines.

An act to exclude persons holding certain judicial offices in Ireland from being Members of the House of Commons.

An act to repeal so much of an act, made in the Parliament of Ireland, in the 14th and 12th years of the reign of King

George the Third, for preventing frauds committed by bankrupts, as inflicts capital punishment on certain offences therein specified, and to provide more suitable and effectual punishment for such offences.

An act for erecting the town of Airdrie, in the county of Lanark, into a burgh of barony, paving, lighting, and improving the same, and establishing a police therein.

An act for enlarging, explaining, and continuing certain acts of his late Majesty's reign, for repairing, and keeping in repair, the road from Parkhouse to or near the Three-mile-house in the county of Lanark.

And to several English road, &c. acts, and nineteen private bills.
