A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE, R.

**W**HEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the twenty-fifth day of this instant November; We, with the advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said twenty-fifth day of this instant November, to Tuesday the third day of February next, and We have given order to Our Chancellor of that part of our United Kingdom called Great Britain, to prepare a commission for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said third day of February next, be held and sit for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and Comanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said third day of February next.

Given at Our Court at Windsor, the eighteenth day of November one thousand eight hundred and twenty-three, and in the fourth year of Our reign.
