WESTMINSTER, March 22, 1826.

**T**HIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act for punishing mutiny and desertion, and for the better payment of the army and their quarters.

An act for the regulating of His Majesty's royal marine forces while on shore.

An act to give effect to treaties of commerce with countries in America not at present provided with national merchant shipping.

An act to indemnify such persons in the United Kingdom as have omitted to qualify themselves for offices and employments, and for extending the time limited for those purposes respectively.

An act to facilitate the advancing of money by the Governor and Company of the Bank of England upon deposits or pledges.

An act to amend so much of an act of the last session of Parliament, for regulating the qualification and the manner of enrolling jurors in Scotland, and of choosing jurors in criminal trials there, and to unite counties for the purposes of trial in cases of high treason in Scotland as relates to the qualification of special jurors.
