WESTMINSTER, May 9, 1828.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for applying a sum of money out of the consolidated fund for the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight.

An Act to repeal the stamp-duties on cards and dice made in the United Kingdom, and to grant other duties in lieu thereof, and to amend and consolidate the Acts relating to such cards and dice and the exportation thereof.

An Act for further regulating the payment of the duties under the management of the Commissioners of Stamps on insurances from loss or damage by fire.

An Act to repeal so much of several Acts as empowers the Commissioners for the Reduction of the National Debt to grant life annuities.

An Act for repealing so much of several Acts as imposes the necessity of receiving the sacrament of the Lord's Supper as a qualification for certain offices and employments.

An Act for rendering a written memorandum necessary to the validity of certain promises and engagements.

An Act to prevent a failure of justice by reason of variances between records and writings produced in evidence in support thereof.

And several English, and six private Acts.

NOTICE is hereby given, that information has been received at this Office from His Majesty's Consul at Elsinore, that the following communication had been made, on the 10th of last month, by the Royal General Board of Customs at Copenhagen, viz.—

“ For the further guidance of shipping through the Cattagat, the Board has this spring placed a sea mark, somewhat more than half a mile, N. by E. per compass, from the most northerly of the four sea marks which, according to Ordinance of 21st February 1805, are kept on the East Coast of Lessoe.

“ This adjoined sea mark will, together with the other ones on the Coast of Lessoe and on Trindeln, until further notice, be kept on the spots pointed out on the charts of Cattagat per 1827, issued by the Danish Sea Chart Archive.

“ It stands on the north east point of the grounds coming out from the Syrodde (the most easterly neze of Lessoe), in six fathoms water, one Danish mile, N. E. by compass, from the south easterly sea mark on the Trindeln.

“ It consists of a pitched beam, with a large broom at the top, about 15 feet above the surface of the water.”
