The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Hon. Lloyd Lord Kenyon, Lord Chief Justice of his Majesty's Court of King's Bench to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Flint, his Lordship this day took the oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the oaths of allegiance and supremacy.

His Majesty was this day pleased to appoint Abraham Leach, junior, of Eastington, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Pembrok e for the year 1797, in the room of Abraham Leach, of Corston, Esq.

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an act passed in the 28th year of the reign of his present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of his Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between his Majesty's Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other things enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for his Majesty in Council, by order or orders to be issued and published from time to time, to authorize, or by warrant or warrants,

under his Sign Manual, to impower the Governor of Newfoundland for the time being to authorize, in case of necessity, the importation into New-foundland of bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, from any of the territories belonging to the faid United States, for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing feason only; provided always, that fuch bread, flour, Indian corn, and live flock, fo authorized to be imported into the island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such rules, regulations, and reflictions as shall be specified in such order or orders, warrant or warrants, respectively, and except by British subjects and in British built ships owned by his Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that provision be made for fully supplying the inhabitants and fishermen of the island of Newfoundland, for the enfuing scuson, with bread, flour, Indian corn, and live flock; his Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the advice of his Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that, for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing seafon only, bread, flour, Indian corn, and live flock be imported into the faid island from any of the territories belonging to the said United States, by British subjects, and in British built ships owned by his Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law, and which shall, within the space of feven months previous to the time of fuch importation; have cleared out from some port in Great Britain, or fome other port of his Majefly's do-

minions in Europe, for which purpose a licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of his Majefly's Cufloms in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of his Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other person or persons who may be duly authorized in that kingdom respectively, in the manner and form herein after mentioned; which licences shall continue and be in force for feven calendar months from the day of the date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no fuch licence as aforefaid, granted after the 30th day of September, one thoufand leven hundred and ninetyleven, shall be of any force or effect: And his Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that the master, or person having the charge or command of any ship or veffel to whom fuch licence shall be granted, shall, upon the arrival of the faid ship or vessel at the port, harbour or place in the island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such bread, flour, Indian corn and live stock, deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper officer of the Customs there, having first indorfed on the back of such licence the marks, numbers and contents of each package of bread, flour, or Indian corn, and the number of live stock, under the penalty of the forfeiture in the faid act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper officer of the Cultoms at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a certificate to the master, or person having the charge or command of such thip or vestel, of his having received the faid licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of his Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of his Majesty's revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such licence was granted. Now be it known that the faid [perfon's name] hath licence to lade on board the faid ship [ship's name], at and from any port or place belonging to the United States of America, bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, the produce of the said United States, and no other article whatsoever, and to carry the said bread, slour, Indian corn, and live stock to some port or place in the

island of Newfoundland; and on the arrival of the faid ship at any port, harbour, or place of discharge in Newfoundland, the master, or person having the charge or command of the said ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper officer of his Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the back thereof the marks, numbers, and contents of each package of bread, slour, or Indian corn, and the number of live stock, and shall thereupon receive a certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper officer of the Customs.

This licence to continue in force for calendar months from the date hereof.

Extract of a letter from Vice-Admiral Onflow to Evan Nepean, Efq. dated on board his Majesty's ship Nassau, in Yarmouth Roads, Feb. 17, 1797.

Be pleased to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that his Majesty's ship Espion is just arrived in these Roads; she separated from the Martin sloop on the night of the 14th inst. in a heavy gale of wind; the latter has charge of the Buonaparte, French ship privateer. I inclose, for their Lordships surther information, Captain Dixon's letter.

Espion at Sea, Feb. 26, 1797. I have the honour to inform you, that at ten, A. M. on the 14th instant, the Texel bearing S. E. distant eighteen leagues, chace was given to a ship under Danish colours on the weather bow, which, after making every effort to get away, was overpressed with fail, and at fix P. M. brought to by the Espion and Martin. She proved to be Le Buonaparte privateer, mounting 16 fix-pounders and one long twelvepounder, with a complement of one hundred and ten men, but had only eighty two on board; she failed from Cherbourg on the 1st instant, fince which she had cruized on the coast of Scotland, and had only captured a floop in ballast, which was liberated; eight fix pounders were thrown overboard during the pursuit; all the day the weather was extremely boisterous, and it was with infinite difficulty and hazard the exchange of prisoners was effected. One boat belonging to the Espion was lost, but happily no lives; and it is but justice to the officers and seamen of both ships to declare they performed the service with manly spirit and determination; as during the night it blew very hard at N.N.W. the Martin and prize unavoidably separated from the Espion; Captain Sutton had been previously defired to flay by the prize, and fee her into Yarmouth.

The privatter is quite new, fails remarkably fast, and is in every respect well found as a vessel of war.

Copy of a letter from Captain Halfted, Commander of his Majesty's ship Phonix, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated at Sea, February 11, 1797.

SIR.

Be pleased to acquaint their Lordships, that the Jeune Emilie, a French privateer brig, of ten guns and fixty-two men, was captured by his Majesty's ship Triton this evening. She has been only forty days from St Maloes, has taken an English sloop called the Friendship, from Lisbon to Liverpool, with fruit, and an English ship Letter of Marque, of ten nine-pounders and twentyone men, called the Battalion, from Liverpool to Jamaica, after an action of three quarters of an hour.

I have also to acquaint you, for their Lord-ships further information, that the Triton captured the French privateer cutter Recovery, of four-teen guns and forty-six men, on the 10th instant, which had been a few days from Havre, and had taken an English smuggler, and an American ship bound to Bombay; the latter was retaken a few hours afterwards by the Stag.
