FOREIGN-OFFICE, February 9, 1830:

IT has been notified by the French Minister for Foreign Affairs to his Majesty's Ambassador at Paris, that the French Government, having been informed that doubts existed on the subject of the Blockade of the Ports of the Regency of Algiers, by the Naval Forces of his Most Christian Majesty, think it right to declare, that Blockade (notified in the Gazette of July 2, 1827) has not been discontinued; and that it extends to the four Ports of Bona, Bugia, Algiers, and Oran:

WHITEHALL, February 8, 1830.

FIRST INTIMATION.

IN the Process of Ranking and Sale, raised and insisted in before the Court of Session, at the instance of JAMES M'KILLOP, Esq. at present residing in London; formerly of the Firm of Cruttenden and M'Killop, of Calcutta, in the Province of Bengal, Merchants and Agents, and for Robert Downie, Esq. of Appin, and John Horsley Palmer, Esq. Merchant in London, and Robert Cruttenden, Esq. of that City, Trustees and Executors in England nominated and appointed by George Cruttenden; Esq. formerly of Calcutta, Merchant and Agent, now deceased, and Messrs.
