All Peers, Eldest Sons of Peers, and Privy Councillors, are to appear in full dress black; the Knights of the several Orders wearing their respective collars; and the Bishops will appear in their rochets.

ADMIRALTY-OFFICE, June 28, 1830.

This day, in pursuance of His Majesty's pleasure, William Peere Williams Freeman, Esq. Admiral of the Red, was promoted to the rank of Admiral of the Fleet.

The King has been pleased to appoint Sir Richard Hussey Bickerton, Bart. K. C. B. Admiral of the Red, to be General of His Majesty's Royal Marine Forces; and Sir William Sidney Smith, K. C. B. Admiral of the Blue, to be Lieutenant-General of His said Majesty's Royal Marine Forces, in the room of Sir Richard Bickerton.

WESTMINSTER, June 23, 1830.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act to apply a certain sum out of the Consolidated Fund to the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty.

An Act to suspend, until the end of the next session of Parliament, the making of lists and the ballots and enrolments for the militia of the United Kingdom.

An Act for taking an account of the population of Great Britain, and of the increase or diminution thereof.

An Act for reducing the duty on malt made from bear or bigg only in Ireland, to the same duty as is payable thereon in Scotland.
