HIS day the Prince de Troubetzskoi, appointed upon a special embassy from the Emperor of All the Russias, to congratulate His Majesty upon his accession to the throne, had audience of His Majesty to take leave upon the termination of the said embassy; the Count de Ludolf, Ambas-sador Extraordinary from the King of the kingdom of the Two Sicilies, for the special purpose of congratulating His Majesty upon his accession to the throne, had audience of His Majesty for that purpose, and afterwards to deliver new credentials as Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to His Majesty; the Prince de Talleyrand, Ambas-sador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the King of the French, had audience of His Majesty to deliver his credentials; the Count Bjornstjerna, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Sweden, had audience of his Majesty to deliver some letters; and Count Mandelsloh, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Pleni-potentiary from the King of Wurtemberg, had au-dience of His Majesty to deliver his credentials; to which several audiences they were respectively introduced by the Earl of Aberdeen, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Sir Robert Chester, Knt. Master of the Ceremonies.
