Office of the Lord Chamberlain to the Queen,
St. James's, November 25, 1830.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Queen has appointed Thursday the 24th of February 1831, for the celebration of Her Majesty's Birthday, when a Drawing-Room will be held at St. James's Palace.

The Queen will not require that any Lady who has already been presented, should be presented a second time.

It is expected that all Ladies attending the Drawing-Room will appear in dresses of British manufacture.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THIS day the Right Honourable Thomas William Viscount Anson; the Right Honourable Sir William Johnstone Hope; and the Right Honourable Robert Grant, were, by His Majesty's command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and took their respective places at the Board accordingly.

WHITEHALL, November 22, 1830.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable Sir William Henry Freemantle, K. H. G. Deputy Ranger of Windsor Great Park.

November 24.

The King has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, appointing the Right Honourable William Charles Earl of Albemarle Master of the Horse to His Majesty.

The King has also been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the said United Kingdom, granting the office of Advocate-General or Judge-Martial of His Majesty's Forces to the Right Honourable Robert Grant.

The King has been pleased to direct a letter to be passed under the Seal appointed by the Treaty of Union, to be made use of in the place of the Great Seal of Scotland, nominating and appointing His Grace George William Duke of Argyll to be Keeper of the said Seal.

St. JAMES'S-PALACE, November 22, 1830.

The King has been pleased to appoint his Grace the Duke of Devonshire Lord Chamberlain of His Majesty's Household, in the room of the Earl of Jersey, resigned.

November 25.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased to deliver the custody of the Seals of the duchy and county palatine of Lancaster to the Right Honourable Henry Richard Lord Holland, the oath of Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster was this day, by His Majesty's command, administered to him accordingly.

November 24.

The King was this day pleased to confer the honour of Knighthood upon Thomas Denman, Esq. His Majesty's Attorney General.

FOREIGN-OFFICE, November 10, 1830.

The King has been pleased to approve of Paul Eynaud, Esq. as Consul for the United States of America at Malta.

WAR-OFFICE, November 23, 1830.

The King has been pleased to appoint Colonel the Viscount Valletort, of the Cornwall Militia, to be one of His Majesty's Aides-de-Camp for the Service of His Militia Force; dated October 28, 1830.

His Majesty has at the same time been pleased to direct that the said Viscount Valletort shall take rank as one of the five Senior Colonels of the Militia, immediately after the Junior Colonel of His Majesty's Forces.

OFFICE OF ORDNANCE, November 19, 1830.

MEMORANDUM.

The King has been pleased to restore Brevet Major William Greene to his rank in the Royal Regiment of Artillery. His commission as Major in the Army is to bear date 12th April 1815.

At the Court at St. James's, Thursday, November 25, 1830.

A Chapter of the Most Noble Order of the Garter having been summoned for this day, the following Knights Companions, in their mantles and collars, and the Officers of the Order, in their mantles, chains, and badges, assembled at St. James's Palace, soon after two o'clock, and having been called over by Garter Principal King of Arms, a procession was made from the Royal Closet to the Chapter-room, in the following order, viz.

The Duke of Richmond.
The Marquess of Exeter. The Duke of Devonshire.
The Duke of Dorset.
The Marquess of Anglesey. The Earl Bathurst.
The Duke of Newcastle.
The Marquess Wellesley.
The Earl of Hardwicke.
The Marquess Camden.

The Earl Spencer. The Earl of Westmorland.
His Royal Highness Prince Leopold of Saxe Coburg.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester.
His Royal Highness the Duke of Sussex. His Royal Highness the Duke of Cumberland.

Sir Thomas Tyrwhitt, Kt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod. The Hon. and Rev. the Dean of Windsor, Register of the Order. Sir George Nayler, Knt. Garter Principal King of Arms.

The Bishop of Salisbury, The Bishop of Winchester, Chancellor of the Order. The Prelate of the Order.

THE SOVEREIGN.

The Sovereign and Knights Companions being seated, the Chancellor, standing on the left hand of His Majesty, signified to the Chapter the Sovereign's royal will and pleasure, that the vacant stall in the Royal Chapel of St. George, at Windsor, be filled; and as by the statutes none but a Knight can be elected, His Grace John Duke of Bedford was introduced into the Royal presence, preceded by Garter and Black Rod, and was knighted by his Majesty with the Sword of State, after which His Grace, having kissed the Sovereign's hand, retired.

The Knights Companions then proceeded to the election, and the suffrages having been collected by the Chancellor, were by his Lordship presented to the Sovereign, who was pleased to command him to declare, and he accordingly declared, that the Most Noble John Duke of Bedford had been duly elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Then, by the Sovereign's command, his Grace was received at the door of the Chapter-room by the Marquess of Exeter and the Duke of Richmond, the two junior Knights Companions, and conducted between them to His Majesty, preceded by Garter (bearing the ensigns of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion), and by Black Rod. The Duke of Bedford kneeling near the Sovereign, and Garter presenting on his knee the Garter, His Majesty, assisted by their Royal Highnesses the Dukes of Cumberland and Sussex, the two senior Knights Companions, buckled it on his Grace's left leg, the Chancellor pronouncing the usual admonition.

Garter next presented, in like manner, the Ribband with the George, and His Majesty, with the assistance of the said two senior Knights Companions, put the same over the Duke's left shoulder, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition. His Grace having kissed the Sovereign's hand, and received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions, withdrew.

The Chapter being ended, Garter, by command of the Sovereign, called over the Knights Companions, and a procession was made back to the Royal Closet, in the same order as before.

THE Exchequer Bills dated in the Months of October, November, and December, 1829, viz. 3. Geo. 4. cap. 86, for carrying on public works and fisheries; 10.
