COUNCIL OFFICE, WHITEHALL, October 28, 1831.

DOUBTS having existed as to the powers vested in Magistrates and others, with a view of carrying into effect the measures necessary to be had recourse to in the case of mariners shipwrecked from vessels liable to quarantine, or of any other persons attempting to evade the quarantine laws; the following clause of an Act, of the sixth year of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, is published for the information of all who may be ignorant of the provisions of the law in this respect.

Sect. 19, of the Act of 6 George the Fourth, cap. 78.

AND be it further enacted, that it shall be lawful for any constable, headborough, tithingman, or other peace officer, or any other person, to seize and apprehend any person that shall, contrary to the provisions of this Act, have quitted or come on shore from any vessel liable to perform quarantine, or who shall have escaped from or quitted any vessel under quarantine, or from any lazaret vessel or place appointed in that behalf, for the purpose of carrying such person before any Justice of the Peace or Magistrate; and it shall be lawful for any such Justice of the Peace or Mait shall be lawful for any such Justice of the Peace or Magistrate, to grant his warrant for the apprehending and conveying of any such person to the vessel from which he or she shall have come on shore, or to any vessel performing quarantine, or lazaret, from which he or she shall have escaped, or for the confining of any such person in any such place of safe custody (not being a public gaol), and under such restrictions as to having any communication with any other persons, as may, in the discretion of any Justice of the Peace or Magistrate (calling to his aid, if he shall see fit, any medical person), appear to be proper, until such person can be safely and securely conveyed to some place appointed for the performance of quarantine, or until directions can be obtained from the Privy Council as to the disposal of any such person, and to make any further order, or grant any further warrant, that may be necessary in that behalf. Acts received the Royal Assent, October 29, 1831.
