At the Court at *St James's*, the 3d of May 1797,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint William Bentinck, Esq. Captain General and Governor in Chief of the Island of St Vincent, Bequia, and such other of the Islands, commonly called the Grenadines, as lie to the northward of the Island of Carriacou, in America, in the room of James Seton, Esq. he this day took the usual oaths appointed to be taken by the governors of his Majesty's plantations.

WESTMINSTER, May 3.

This day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Mr Quarre, the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that "the Lords, authorised by virtue of his Majesty's Commission for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read;" and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An act for confirming and continuing, for a limited time, the restriction contained in the Mi-

nute of Council of the 26th of February 1797, on payment of cash by the Bank.

An act for making certain annuities, created by the Parliament of the kingdom of Ireland, transferable, and the dividends thereon payable at the Bank of England; and for the better security of the proprietors of such annuities and of the Governor and Company of the Bank of England.

An act for discharging the estates of John Yeldham, Esq. from certain demands of the Crown, upon the conditions therein mentioned.

An act for altering, amending, and rendering more effectual two acts, made in the 11th and 15th years of the reign of his present Majesty, for the regulation and improvement of the fisheries in the river Tweed and the river and streams running into the same, and also within the mouth or entrance of the said river.

An act for repairing, improving, and maintaining the harbour of Eyemouth in the county of Berwick.

An act for repairing, deepening, enlarging and preserving the harbour of Barmouth in the county of Merioneth.

An act for enabling the Company of Proprietors of the Leicester Navigation to finish and complete their several works, and to discharge the debts contracted in the making thereof; and for amending an act, passed in the 31st year of the reign of his present Majesty, for making the said navigation and several other works in such act mentioned.

An act for regulating and converting the Statute Labour in the County of Fife; and for more

effectually making and repairing the highways within the said County.

An act for enlarging the term and Powers of three several acts, passed in the thirty-first year of the reign of his late Majesty, and in the first and eighteenth years of the reign of his present Majesty, for repairing the road from Leeds to Sheffield in the County of York, so far as the same relate to the road from Wakefield to Sheffield.

An act for enlarging the term and powers of an act, made in the seventeenth year of the reign of his present Majesty, for repairing the road from Halifax to Sheffield, in the West Riding of the County of York, so far as the same relate to the road from Penistone to Sheffield.

An act for enlarging the term and powers of so much of an act, passed in the thirty-fourth year of his present Majesty's reign, as relates to the road from the toll house in Paisley Lane, at the west side of the entry to the New Bridge of Glasgow, by or near Parkhouse, to the east end of the bridge at Renfrew.

An act for enlarging the term and powers of several acts, made in the twenty-sixth, twenty-seventh, and thirtieth years of his late Majesty's reign, and in the twenty-ninth and thirty-second years of his present Majesty's reign, for making and repairing the roads from Gorbals of Glasgow to Hoak Bridge and Easter Grange, in the County of Renfrew, and other roads in the said County; and for making and repairing certain other roads in the said County, branching from or connected with the roads mentioned in the said acts.

An act for amending and rendering more effectual so much of two acts, made in the twenty-ninth and thirty-third years of the reign of his present Majesty, for making and repairing certain roads in the County of Perth, as relates to the road from Perth to Crieff, and the branches thereof.

An act for more effectually amending, improving, and keeping in repair the road from the west Cowgate, near the town of Newcastle upon Tyne, through the west end of Kenton, Ponteland, Higham Dykes, Newham Edge, Belfay Mill, and South Middleton, to the north side of the river Wanspeck, in the County of Northumberland, and also the road leading from the said road to the Almouth turnpike road.

An act for repairing, widening, and improving the public high road leading from Milnthorpe to Kirby Lonsdale, in the County of Westmoreland.

And to fix private bills.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Durham, Commander of his Majesty's ship Anson, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated in Cawland Bay, May 4, 1797.

I beg leave to acquaint you, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that in consequence of orders from Commodore Sir John Warren, Bart. I have this moment anchored with his Majesty's ship under my command, and have further to inform you, that I yesterday afternoon retook, off the Lizard, the Bella-Isle, of Maryport, which vessel had been captured a few days ago, off Waterford, by the Bullione French privateer, of 14 guns.

Copy of a letter from Rear-Admiral Sir John Orde, Bart. Commanding Officer of his Majesty's ships and vessels at Plymouth, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated May 3, 1797.

SIR,

Enclosed I transmit a letter from Captain Seymour, Commander of his Majesty's sloop Spitfire, acquainting me of his having captured L'Amiable Manette, French brig privateer, of 14 guns and 69 men, which he has brought into this port; she appears a beautiful vessel, is quite new, and half coppered.

SIR,

I have the honour to inform you of the Spitfire's arrival with L'Amiable Manette, French brig privateer, of Nantes, 14 guns and 69 men, out thirteen days; had taken nothing; captured, after a chase of eight hours, on the 1st inst.

The evening before she was taken she had fought an outward-bound English yellow-sided ship, carrying 16 nine-pounders, which had killed and wounded fifteen of her crew, and obliged her to sheer off.
