WESTMINSTER, June 23, 1832.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to apply the sum of four millions, out of the Consolidated Fund, to the service of the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two.

An Act for consolidating and amending the laws relating to the payment of army prize-money.

An Act to continue and extend the provisions of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, for giving additional facilities in applications to Courts of Equity, regarding the management of estates or funds belonging to charities, and for making certain provisions respecting estates or funds belonging to charities.

An Act to suspend, until the end of the next session of Parliament, the making of lists and the ballots and enrolments for the militia of the United Kingdom.

An Act to extend the provisions of an Act of the first year of the reign of His present Majesty, for altering and amending the law regarding commitments by Courts of Equity for contempts, and the taking bills pro confesso, and to explain certain parts thereof.

An Act for making provision for the dispatch of the business now done by the Court of Exchequer in Scotland.

An Act to regulate the practice and the fees in the Vice-Admiralty Courts abroad, and to obviate doubts as to their jurisdiction.

An Act to extend the provisions of an Act, of the fifty-seventh year of His Majesty King George the Third, for regulating the offices of Clerks of the Signet and Privy Seal.

An Act to enable His Majesty, his heirs, and successors, to appoint a Trustee of the British Museum.

An Act for altering and amending certain Acts for regulating the police of the city of Edinburgh, and the adjoining districts; and for other purposes relating thereto.

An Act for amending and enlarging the powers and renewing the term granted by certain Acts, passed for improving the communication between the city of Glasgow and the city of Carlisle.

An Act for amending and continuing the Acts relating to the road from Elvan Foot, in the county of Lanark, to Beattock-bridge, in the county of Dumfries.

And several English, Irish, and six private Acts.
