We, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Chancellor, Rector, Principal and Professors of the University and King's College of Aberdeen, beg leave most humbly to approach the Throne, and to present our heartfelt congratulations on your Majesty's late providential escape from the atrocious attempt upon your Majesty's royal person.

We cannot, in any case behold, without indignation, the passions of ignorant and misguided men stirred up to deeds of violence, under the pretext that they are the victims of real or supposed injuries; and with the utmost detestation must we regard an attack on the life of a Sovereign so justly endeared to his people, by his ardent desire to promote the happiness of his subjects of every rank in the State.

That the Almighty Governor of the Universe may in time to come, as in the days that are past, avert from your Majesty every danger, and enable your Majesty to persevere in the performance of every royal duty, is the fervent prayer of, May it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by his Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to enable His Majesty to carry into effect a Convention made between His said Majesty and the Emperor of all the Russias.

An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs.

An Act to reduce the duties now payable, in certain cases, on carriages with less than four wheels.

An Act to authorise the identifying of lands and other possessions of certain ecclesiastical and collegiate corporations.

And three Irish Acts.

August 4.

An Act to prevent the application of Corporate property to the purposes of election of members to serve in Parliament.

An Act for shortening the time of prescription in certain cases.

An Act for regulating Schools of Anatomy.

An Act to permit the distillation of spirits from mangel wurzel.

An Act to defray the charge of the pay, clothing, and contingent and other expenses of the disembodied militia in Great Britain and Ireland, and to grant allowances in certain cases to subaltern-officers, adjutants, pay-masters, quarter-masters, surgeons, assistant-surgeons, surgeons'-mates, and serjeant-majors of the militia, until the first day of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty-three.
