ST JAMES'S, June 3.

The following address has been presented to the King; which address his Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Unto the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble address of the Master, Wardens, Assistants, and Elder Brethren, of the Corporation of Trinity-House of Deptford Strond.

Most Gracious Sovereign.

We, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the ancient body corporate of the seamen of England, humbly beg leave to approach your Majesty, to express the deep concern, which, in common with all your Majesty's faithful subjects, we feel at the present disgraceful conduct of some of the seamen of your Majesty's fleet, who, instigated, no doubt, by the wicked insinuations of some evil disposed persons, enemies alike to your Majesty's royal person and to their country, have been betrayed into acts of insubordination and outrage, degrading to the character of British seamen, hitherto as highly distinguished for loyalty and good conduct, as for intrepidity in vanquishing their enemies: Impelled, therefore, by the duty we owe to your Majesty and to our country, we step forward, at this alarming crisis, to declare our readiness to support, with our lives, such measures as your Majesty, in your wisdom, may think most expedient to adopt for the restoration of good order and subordination among the seamen of your Majesty's fleet.

TO THE CREDITORS OF

WILLIAM CLARK, Merchant in Brechin.

The said William Clark having, at the meeting of his creditors held immediately after his second examination, made a proposal and offer of composition, which the creditors assembled at said meeting thought just and reasonable, and offered caution for the same to their satisfaction, in terms of the act of Parliament—David Black, writer in Brechin, the trustee on the sequestrated estate of the said William Clark, requests a general meeting of the creditors, to be held within the ordinary Court-room of Brechin, on Thursday the 22d instant, for the purpose of deciding upon the said offer, and determining whether the same shall be accepted or rejected.

At a meeting of the said creditors, on the 23d of May last, Charles Calder, hatter in Edinburgh, was chosen trustee upon the sequestrated estate of the said John Jackson, and his nomination confirmed by the Court of Session upon the 31st of May last. The Sheriff has now fixed the 20th day of June current, and the 4th of July next, at 12 o'clock noon, in the Sheriff Clerk's Office, Edinburgh, for the public examination of the bankrupt, his family, and others acquainted with his business.

A general meeting of the creditors is to be held in John's Coffeehouse, Edinburgh, on Wednesday the 5th of July next, at 12 o'clock noon, for naming commissioners, and instructing the trustee as to the management and recovery of the estate. And the trustee hereby requires such of the creditors as have not already lodged their claims and vouchers or grounds of debt, with oaths of verity thereon, to lodge the same with him, at or previous to the said meeting, and failing thereof to do so on or before the 8th day of February next, being ten months from the first deliverance on the petition for sequestration. With certification to such of them as shall fail to comply with this requisition, that they shall have no share in the first distribution of the bankrupt's estate.

THERE being a want of Surgeons Mates to serve in his Majesty's Navy, the Commissioners for Sick and Wounded Seamen do hereby give notice to such gentlemen as are willing to serve therein, that they may, on application at this Office, receive letters for examination before the Surgeons Company of London; or, if more agreeable to the parties, by applying to Dr Hamilton of the Royal Infirmary at Edinburgh, they may receive letters for examination before the Royal College of Surgeons at that place, and afterwards be appointed to ships, according to their qualifications. His Majesty has been pleased to direct, by his Order in Council, dated 28th May 1795, that the pay of Surgeons Mates should be increased; and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty have, by their order of the 19th of November 1796, directed that further encouragement should be given, the particulars of which may be known by applying to Dr Hamilton, as above, or to Mr Wood, Surgeon to Prisoners of War at Edinburgh.
