WESTMINSTER, July 4. 1797.

**T**HIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Mr Quarme, the Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that the Lords, authorized by virtue of his Majesty's Commission for declaring his Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for carrying into execution the Treaty of Amity, Commerce and Navigation, concluded between his Majesty and the United States of America.

An Act to revive and continue the bounties granted by an Act made in the twenty-sixth year of the reign of his present Majesty for encouraging the fisheries carried on at Newfoundland and parts adjacent, from Great Britain, Ireland, and the British dominions in Europe; to continue so much of an Act made in the thirty-third year of the reign of his present Majesty, as permits the importation and exportation of certain goods, wares, and merchandizes in foreign ships, into and from the port of St John's in the Island of Antigua; and so much of an Act made in the thirty-third of the reign of his present Majesty, as permits Sir William Bishop, George Bishop and Argles Bishop, to carry on the manufacture of Maidstone Geneva; and also so much of an Act made in the thirty-fifth year of

the reign of his present Majesty, for better securing the duties on glass, as was to continue for a limited time.

An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act made in the thirty-first year of the reign of his late Majesty King George II. intituled an Act for the due making of bread, and to regulate the price and assize thereof, and to punish persons who shall adulterate meal, flour, or bread, so far as the same relates to the assize and making of bread, to be sold in the city of London and the liberties thereof, and within the weekly bills of mortality, and within ten miles of the Royal Exchange.

An Act for enlarging and improving the harbour of Aberdeen, for building new quays, wharfs, and docks, and for making new roads and passages, and widening others leading to and from the said harbour.
