Extract of a letter from Rear-Admiral HARVEY, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels at the Leeward Islands, to EVAN NEPEAN, Esq. dated on board the Prince of Wales, Fort Royal Bay, Martinique, the 29th of May 1797.

INCLOSED is an account of captures and recaptures made by the ships of his Majesty's Squadron under my command, as against their respective names expressed, between the 18th of March 1797 and the date hereof:

An account of vessels captured and recaptured by his Majesty's ships and vessels under the command of Rear-Admiral HARVEY, Commander in Chief at the Leeward Islands, between the 18th of March 1797 and the 30th of May following.

Schooner Ranger, from Wilmington, bound to Trinidad, laden with lumber and slaves, belonging to Massachusetts; retaken from the French to the windward of Mariegalante by the Vanguard, and sent into St Pierre's, Martinique.

Schooner Nobby, from Wexcaffet, bound to the West Indies, laden with lumber and slaves, belonging to Massachusetts; retaken from the French off Mariegalante, by the Vanguard, and sent into St Pierre's, Martinique.

Schooner Little Mary, from Surinam bound to Philadelphia, laden with coffee, cotton, and sugar, belonging to Philadelphia, retaken from the French off Mariegalante by the Vanguard, and sent into St Pierre's, Martinique.—Went on shore.

Ship Hero, from London, laden with provisions, retaken from a French privateer off St Kitt's by the Lapwing, and sent into St Kitt's.

Brig Paramaou, George Curd master, from Surinam, bound to St Thomas, laden with molasses, sugar, and coffee, belonging to Baltimore; retaken from a French privateer between Tortola and St Croix by the Fury, and sent into Tortola.

Snow Rebecca, from Demarara, bound to St Thomas, laden with sugar and coffee; retaken from a French privateer to windward of the Virgin Islands by the Fury, and sent into Tortola.—Papers not found.

Sloop General, H. Bloomsbury master, from Barbadoes bound to Martinique, laden with dry goods and provisions; recaptured from the enemy off Gaudaloupe, by the Perdrix, and sent into Fort Royal, Martinique.

Schooner Phoenix, Jacob Perkins master, from Tobago bound to St Thomas, laden with 50 puncheons of rum, belonging to New York; retaken from a French privateer to the north-east of St Croix; by the Fury, and sent into Tortola.

Ship Lealand, U. Beaumain master, from Gaudaloupe, bound to Santa Cruz, laden with coffee, sugar, and cotton, belonging to Barbadoes; taken to windward of St Croix by the Favourite, and sent to Tortola.—Detained, having French property.

Ship Atlanti, Thomas Stockel master, from Teneriffe, laden with wine and dry goods; recaptured from the enemy 37 leagues south west by south of Barbuda, by the Lapwing, and sent into Basse Terre, St Kitt's.

Schooner Adelgarde, Bartolame Table master, from Cuba bound to Porto Rico, laden with wax and tortoiseshell; taken off Porto Rico by the Arethusa, and sent into Martinique. Detained being Spanish property.

Ship Scipio, from Gaudaloupe bound to St Thomas, in ballast, belonging to Liverpool; recaptured from the French off Gaudaloupe, by the Scipio, and sent into Roseau, Dominica.

Schooner Jean Kirby, bound to Gaudaloupe, in ballast, belonging to Antigua; recaptured from the French off Gaudaloupe, by the Scipio, and sent into Roseau, Dominica.

SIR,
BE pleased to acquaint the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that his Majesty's sloop Cyane, being off Dominica the 3d instant, captured La Bayonnaise French schooner privateer, belonging to Gaudaloupe, carrying two guns, some swivels, and 36 men, which the Captain sent to Martinique.

We, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, in obedience to his Majesty's commands, do publish and declare, that the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is, hereby dissolved: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses of the House of Commons, are discharged from their meeting and attendance on the said 10th day of August next.
