WESTMINSTER, JULY 19, 1797.

This day thirty four public, and eighteen private bills received the Royal Assent by commission; among which are—the Scotch Militia Bill—the Scotch Distillery Bill—House Duty—Stamp Deed Duty—Clock and Watch—Horse, and Male Servants Duties Bills. The Bill to shorten the time now required for giving notice of his Majesty's intention to convene Parliament. The Slave Ship Regulation Bill, the Fife Road Bill, the Corn Exportation Bill, &c. &c.

WESTMINSTER, JULY 20.

This day his Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in his Royal Robes, seated on the throne with the usual solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a message from his Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to eleven public bills, and one private, among which are; the act enabling the Scotch Bank to issue small notes; the act disabling Officers of the Excise and Customs to vote at Elections in Scotland; the East India Judicature Bills; the Legacy Duty Bill, &c. &c.

After which his Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious speech.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I cannot put an end to this Session of Parliament without returning you my most sincere

and cordial thanks for the assiduity and zeal with which you have applied yourselves to the important objects which have required your attention, and for the wisdom and firmness which you have manifested in the new and difficult emergencies for which you have had to provide.

I must particularly express the just sense I entertain of the salutary and effectual provisions which you have made for strengthening the means of national defence, and the measures adopted for obviating the inconveniences which were to be apprehended to credit from the temporary suspension of payments in cash by the Bank; as well as of the promptitude, vigour, and effect, with which you have afforded me your assistance and support in suppressing the daring and treasonable mutiny which broke out in a part of my fleet, and in counteracting so dangerous and pernicious an example.

I have the satisfaction to acquaint you, that since the accession of the present Emperor of Russia, the commercial engagements between the two countries have been renewed in such a manner as will, I doubt not, materially conduce to their mutual interests.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I must return you my particular thanks for the liberal and extensive provision which you have made for the various exigencies of the public service; and, while I lament the necessity which increased them to so large an amount, it is a consolation to me to observe the attention you have employed in distributing the heavy burdens which

they occasioned, in such a manner as to render their pressure as little severe as possible on my people.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

The issue of the important negociation in which I am engaged is yet uncertain: But, whatever may be the event, nothing will have been wanting, on my part, to bring it to a successful termination on such conditions as may be consistent with the security, honour, and essential interests of my dominions. In the mean time, nothing can so much tend to forward the attainment of peace as the continuance of that zeal, exertion, and public spirit, of which my subjects have given such conspicuous and honourable proofs, and of which the perseverance and firmness of Parliament has afforded them so striking an example.

The Lord Chancellor, by his Majesty's command, then said:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

It is his Majesty's Royal will and pleasure, That this Parliament be prorogued to Thursday, the fifth day of October next, to be then here holden, and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Thursday, the fifth day of October next.

Extract of a Letter from Vice Admiral Sir Hyde Parker, Knt. Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels at Jamaica, to Evan Nepean, Esq. June 11, 1797.

I have the pleasure to acquaint you for their Lordships Information, that the Grand Ance is acknowledged to be saved by a spirited and well timed attack made by Captain Ricketts, of his Majesty's ship La Magicienne, upon the enemy's transports of provisions and ammunition in Carcasse Bay, for the particulars of which I beg leave to refer you to a copy of Captain Rickett's letter.

You will also receive herewith a copy of a letter from Captain Mends, of his Majesty's brig Diligence, together with a list of armed vessels taken by the Squadron since my letter of the 27th of April.

La Magicienne, in Carcasse Bay, St. Domingo,
April 24, 1797.

SIR,

I beg leave to inform you, that on Sunday the 23d instant, when doubling Cape Tiberoon, in

company with the Regulus and Fortune schooner, we discovered a six-gun privateer sloop and four schooners at anchor in this bay, which convinced me that the post of Irois was attacked: Soon after the alarm gun was fired at the fort. As no time was to be lost in endeavouring to counteract the views of the enemy, we stood in and anchored, when we commenced a heavy cannonade, and had the good fortune, in a short time, to drive them into the mountains; their field pieces, ammunition, provisions, and vessels laden with necessaries for carrying on the siege, fell into our hands.

The good conduct of every officer and sailor belonging to our little squadron, manifested itself upon this occasion, as well as upon many others, since I have had the honour to command it. I have to regret the loss of four men killed, and Mr Morgan, Master's mate, and ten men wounded (though not mortally,) who were in the Magicienne's boat when endeavouring to tow out the privateer.

SIR,

I beg leave to inform you, that having cleared the Bahama Straits the 3d of this month, the following day, ten leagues S.W. of the Pan of Montozas, we fell in with and took, after an action of three quarters of an hour, La Nativetas, of sixteen guns and fifty men, about five hundred tons, laden with logwood, had left the Havannah that morning for Cadiz. I have the pleasure of testifying the best conduct of my officers and people in this little affair, and have no doubt but they will distinguish themselves when any occasion offers, and I am happy to add we had only one man slightly wounded.

Copy of a Letter from Vice Admiral Kingmill, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels at Cork, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated on board his Majesty's ship L'Engagante, Cork Harbour, July 13, 1797.

SIR,

Please to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that his Majesty's ship Santa Maria

garita is returned, and has brought in L'Adour, a fine new French ship out of Bayonne, carrying sixteen guns and one hundred and forty-seven men, being the second privateer she has taken during her late cruize.

Inclosed is Captain Parker's letter to me, giving a further account of her, for the information of their Lordships.

Santa Margarita, Cork Harbour, July 13.

SIR,

I have to inform you, that on the 10th instant, Cape Clear bearing N. E. by E. eight leagues, I captured L'Adour French ship privateer, belonging to Bayonne, pierced for twenty guns, but mounting 16 nine and six pounders, and one hundred and forty seven men; she had been on the coast ten days, and has taken the Betsy, from Newfoundland, bound to Bristol, and sent her to Bayonne.

It is very fortunate the above ship is taken, as the must have done great damage to the trade, being a very fast sailer, but two months launched, well found, and compleatly victualled and stored for a three months cruize.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Tyler, of his Majesty's ship L'Aigle, to Admiral Earl St Vincent, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels employed on the coast of Portugal, dated at sea, June 13, 1797.

I sailed from Lisbon on the 7th instant, and on the 12th I captured a brig of six guns and 24 men; she had been out but eight days from Bourdeaux, and bound to the Isle of France.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Morris, of his Majesty's ship Boston, to Admiral Earl St Vincent, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels employed on the coast of Portugal; dated off Cape Finisterre, June 17.

I have the honour to inform you, that his Majesty's ship, under my command, yesterday morning captured the St Bernardo, alias El Conquistador, privateer, of 12 guns and 75 men, belonging to Ribadeo; seven days out of port and had not taken any thing.

Extract of a letter from the Hon. Captain Curzon, Commander of his Majesty's ship Pallas, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated at Spithead, the 20th of July 1797.

On the 16th inst. being in lat. 44 deg. 30 min. long. 15 deg. 10 min. I fell in with and captured the Spanish ship Letter of Marque, St Jose y Nostra Signora de Begoyna, mounting sixteen 6 pounders, with 52 men, laden with brandy, wine, and flour, from Bilbao, bound to the Caraccas—out twelve days, and had not taken any thing.

I arrived here this day with his Majesty's ship under my command, in company with the prize.
