A PROCLAMATION,

*For giving Currency to a new Coinage of Copper
Money of One Penny and Two Penny Pieces.*

GEORGE R.

Whereas in consequence of the unanimous address of our Commons of Great Britain, in Parliament assembled, praying that we would be graciously pleased to give directions that measures might be taken for an immediate supply of such copper coinage as might be best adapted to the payment of the laborious poor in the present exigency; we have thought fit to order, that certain pieces of copper should be coined, which should go and pass for one penny and two pennies, and that each of such pieces of one penny should weigh one ounce Avoirdupois, and that each of such two penny pieces should weigh two ounces Avoirdupois; the intrinsic value of such pieces of one penny and two pennies; workmanship included, corresponding as nearly as possible with the nominal value of the same respectively; every such piece having, on one side thereof, our effigies or portraiture, with our name or title, and on the reverse, the figure of Britannia, represented sitting on a rock in the sea, holding a trident in her left hand, and a branch of olive in her right hand, with the year of our Lord.—And whereas penny and two penny pieces of copper, of the weight and description aforesaid, have been coined, and will be soon ready for delivery, according to the orders which we have given for that purpose: We

have therefore, with the advice of our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this our royal proclamation, and we do hereby ordain, declare and command, that the said pieces of copper money, so coined as aforesaid, shall be current and lawful money of our kingdom of Great Britain, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful money of our said kingdom; that is to say, such penny pieces as of the value of one penny, and such two penny pieces as of the value of two pennies, in all payments and transactions of money; provided that no person shall be obliged to take more of such copper money in any one payment, than shall be of the value of one shilling, after the rate aforesaid.

Given at our Court at St James's, the twenty-sixth day of July, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, in the thirty-seventh year of our reign.

Extract of a Letter from the Right Hon. Lord Bridport, K. B. Admiral of the White, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated on board his Majesty's ship Royal George, at sea, July 24, 1797.

I acquaint you, for their Lordships information, that I this day joined the ships under the orders of Sir John B. Warren, who has transmitted to me the inclosed letters and papers, which are copies of originals he sent by express to me at Torbay, which did not arrive there till after I had quitted that anchorage.

La Pomone, at sea, July 18, 1797.

MY LORD,

I beg leave to acquaint your Lordship, that in obedience to your command, I continued off Ushant with his Majesty's Squadron under my orders, consisting of the following ships and vessels, *La Pomone, Attois, Anson, Sylph, and Dolly* cutter, until the 16th inst. when hearing the report of many guns to the southward, I stood round the west end of the Saints, and at day-break in the morning of the 17th I discovered a frigate, with a ship, corvette, and brig, having 14 sail of vessels under convoy, in *Hodierne Bay*, eight of which were captured.

I am sorry to add, that the ship, corvette, and brig, escaped round the Penmarks, and the frigate, by cutting away her masts, and being otherways lightened, ran on shore: A brig, laden with ordnance and naval stores, came to an anchor near her, where it was impossible for the *Anson* and *Sylph* to follow. The brig, however, was sunk, and the frigate (*La Calliope*) much damaged in her hull by the shot of the abovementioned ship, whose officers and men behaved with the greatest zeal and activity, which induces me to hope that the enemy will not be enabled to get her off, as the wind soon after changed to the south west, with a great swell upon the beach.

I was obliged to burn *La Freedom*, a large ship armée en flute, laden with squared timber, as the enemy had run her on shore at high water, and the crew, with the wounded, got away in their boats.

I have enclosed to your Lordship a list of the vessels captured and destroyed on the 17th inst. with a return of the wounded on board his Majesty's brig *Sylph*.

MY LORD,

I have the satisfaction of acquainting your Lordship, that I had an opportunity of seeing that *La Calliope* Republican frigate, of 36 guns and 250 men, that was left on shore on the 17th by the *Anson* and *Sylph*, is totally destroyed, having separated in the mid-ship body, and part of her sunk. The crew are encouraged near her to save such stores, as may be driven on shore.

I am particularly indebted to Captain White, of the *Sylph* brig, who having anchored with springs on his cable within pistol shot of the said frigate on the above day, and for some hours kept up an incessant and well directed fire, which was at every convenient opportunity returned by her.

I perceived likewise the wrecks of *La Freedom*, armed en flute, laden with timber, and the brig with ordnance stores, which were driven on shore the same day, and destroyed.

Extract of a letter from Admiral Sir Peter Parker, Bart. Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels at Portsmouth, to Evan Nepean, Esq. dated the 25th of July 1797.

Please to acquaint their Lordships, that his Majesty's armed cutter *Telemachus*, arrived here yesterday evening, with *La Hardi* French privateer lugger, of four carriage guns and thirty men:—That active Officer, Lieutenant Newton, also brought in with him two brigs, which had been captured by a French privateer, and were retaken by the *Telemachus* the 23d inst. as reported in the inclosed letter.

Telemachus cutter, Spithead, July 25, 1797.

SIR,

I have the honour to inform you, that yesterday, at half past two o'clock A. M. off Cape La Hogue, his Majesty's cutter under my command captured *Le Hardi*, a French lugger privateer, mounting four carriage guns, small arms, &c. and manned with thirty men; she had been out from Cherbourg about five hours, and had not taken any thing; and I have the pleasure to add, that I retook two merchant brigs the same day, that had been captured by a French privateer.

Extract of a Letter from Admiral Sir Peter Parker, Commander in Chief of his Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Portsmouth, to Evan Nepean Esq. dated on board the Royal William at Spithead, July 27, 1797.

Inclosed is a letter from Lieutenant Garrett, of the Trial cutter, giving an account of his having captured Le Courier de la Mer, French privateer, of 12 guns and 20 men, and captured a brig taken by the said privateer.

SIR, Trial, Spithead, July 27, 1797.

I have the honour to acquaint you that, on Monday evening last, observing the signal on Portland Point for an enemy's cruiser, I ordered the Chasse Marées to anchor in Portland Roads, and proceeded in his Majesty's cutter under my command in quest of her; at half past two, Tuesday morning, I discovered two brigs standing to the southward, which I immediately gave chase to, and soon perceived them to be a French privateer and her prize; about half past four I got within gun-shot of the privateer, and at five, after giving us two broadsides (which fortunately did us no damage), she struck, Portland bearing N.E. by E. three leagues; she proved to be the Courier de la Mer, André Mouilleron, Captain, mounting 12 small carriage guns, and had, when she failed, 51 men, but when taken only 20. She had been out four days, and had taken three prizes, one of which I have since retaken; having so many prisoners on board I thought proper to return here.
