ORDERS for the Court's going into mourning, on Sunday next the 19th instant, for His late Serene Highness Frederick Duke of Saxe Altenburgh, viz.

The Ladies to wear black, with fringed or plain linen, with gloves, necklaces and ear-rings, black or white shoes, fans and tippets.

The Gentlemen to wear black, full trimmed, fringed or plain linen, black swords and buckles.

The Court to change the mourning on Sunday the 26th instant, viz.

The Ladies to wear black silk or velvet, coloured ribbons, fans and tippets, or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuffs, with black ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear black coats, and black or plain white, or white and gold, or white and silver stuff waistcoats, full trimmed, coloured swords and buckles.

And on Thursday the 30th instant, the Court to go out of mourning.

It is this day ordered by His Majesty in Council, that the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Thursday the twenty-third day of October instant, be further prorogued to Tuesday the twenty-fifth day of November next.
