Copy of a letter from Captain PEARSON, of his Majesty's floop Stork, dated off Scarborough, the 16th of August 1797, to EVAN NEPEAN, Efq.

I have to acquaint you, for the information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that, on the night of the 15th instant, at eleven P.M. in his Majefty's floop Stork under my command, the Humber bearing West about four leagues, I fell in with, and, after a short chace, captured Le Lynx, a French lugger privateer, of 14 guns and 50 men, belonging to Dunkirk; which place she sailed from on the 13th, and I am very happy to fay had taken nothing.

DUBLIN CASTLE, Aug. 12.

This day being the anniversary of the birth of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, the great guns at the salute battery in his Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three rounds, and answered by vollies from the regiments in garrison, which were drawn up in the Royal Square at the barracks. In the evening a play was given by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant to the Ladies; and at night there were bonsires, illuminations, and every other demonstration of joy throughout the city.
