William Paxton and Company, of Buckingham Street, then of Arundel Street, and afterwards of Surry Street, Strand, London, East India Agents; he was the only Son of the late Robert Shields, of 29, Charing Cross, Perfumer, by Margaret his Wife, formerly Margaret Tait, Spinster, and the said John Tait Shields died on the 21st day of February 1835, in his 60th year. It appears that in 1813, Martha Gardner of Glasgow was the Aunt of the Lunatic on the Father's side, that Jane Henderson of Peterhead, N. B. was the Aunt of the Lunatic on the Mother's side, and that Crawford Tait of the City of Edinburgh, North Britain, Writer to the Signet, (only Child of John Tait deceased, a Brother of the said Lunatic's Mother), was the Cousin of the said Lunatic.
