It appears that in 1813, Martha Gardner of Glasgow was the Aunt of the Lunatic on the Father's side, that Jane Henderson of Peterhead, N. B. was the Aunt of the Lunatic on the Mother's side, and that Crawford Tait of the City of Edinburgh, North Britain, Writer to the Signet, (only Child of John Tait deceased, a Brother of the said Lunatic's Mother), was the Cousin of the said Lunatic.
