At the Court at Brighton, the 20th day of November 1835,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of His present Majesty's reign, intitled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, by any Order or Orders in Council to be issued from time to time, to give such directions and make such regulations, touching the trade and commerce to and from any British possessions on or near the Continent of Europe, or within the Mediterranean Sea, or in Africa, or within the limits of the East India Company's charter, excepting the possessions of the said Company, as to His Majesty in Council shall appear most expedient and salutary, any thing in the said Act to the contrary notwithstanding; and that if any goods shall be imported or exported, in any manner contrary to any such Order of His Majesty in Council, the same shall be forfeited, together with the ship importing or exporting the same.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the said recited Act of Parliament, and in exercise of the authority thereby in His Majesty in Council in that behalf vested, it is hereby ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that no goods shall be imported into, nor shall any goods, except the produce of the fisheries in British ships, be exported from, His Majesty's colonies of New South Wales and Van Dieman's Land by sea, from

or to any place other than the United Kingdom, or some other of His Majesty's possessions abroad, except into or from the respective ports of Sydney, in New South Wales, and of Hobart-town and Lancelstown, in Van Dieman's Land; and it is hereby ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the free importation of goods into, and the free exportation of goods from, the said ports of Sydney, Hobart-town, and Lancelstown, shall be permitted, and that the same ports shall be free warehousing ports;

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
