A PROCLAMATION.
WILLIAM, R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the seventeenth day of this instant December; We, with the advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said seventeenth day of this instant December, to Thursday the fourth day of February next; and We have given order to Our Lords Commissioners for the custody of the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to prepare a commission for proroguing the same accordingly; and We do further hereby, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said fourth day of February next, assemble and be holden for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required and commanded to give their attendance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said fourth day of February next.

Given at Our Court at Brighton, this fourth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, and in the sixth year of Our reign.

FOREIGN-OFFICE, December 11, 1835.

IT has been notified by the Reis Effendi to His Majesty's Ambassador at the Ottoman Porte, that the blockade of the ports of Albania (announced in the London Gazette of the 11th August 1835), has been discontinued.

WHITEHALL, December 9, 1835.

The King has been pleased to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal, appointing the Right Honourable Viscount Howick, the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, G. C.
