WESTMINSTER, July 27, 1838.

**T**HIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the commission read*; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to consolidate and amend the laws for collecting and securing the duties of excise on glass.

An Act to amend the laws relating to the qualification of Members to serve in Parliament.

An Act to amend an Act for punishing idle and disorderly persons and rogues and vagabonds.

An Act for the better and more effectually carrying into effect the treaties and conventions made with Foreign Powers, for suppressing the slave trade.

An Act to carry into effect an additional article to a treaty with Sweden, relative to the slave trade.

An Act for carrying into effect a convention of the Hans towns to two conventions with the King of the French, for suppressing the slave trade.

An Act for carrying into effect an additional article to a treaty with the Netherlands, relating to the slave trade.

An Act to regulate and secure the debt due by the city of Edinburgh to the public; to confirm an agreement between the said city and its creditors; and to effect a settlement of the affairs of the said city and the town of Leith.

An Act to alter and amend, and in part repeal the powers of certain Acts, for supplying the city of Glasgow and suburbs with water, to enable the company of proprietors

of the Glasgow Water-works to purchase the Cranstonhill Water-works, and to raise a further sum of money, and to alter the rates leviable by the said company of proprietors.
