THAT it is intended to apply to PARLIAMENT during the ensuing Session, for leave to bring in a BILL for an Act for consolidating the following Acts, in so far as the same refer to the supplying the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenock with fresh and wholesome Water, and paving, cleansing, lighting, and watching the streets, and other public places within the said Town, and Police thereof, and of the Harbours and Port of Greenock, and other purposes undermentioned, viz.—An Act passed in the 13th year of the reign of His Majesty George the Third, entitled, ‘An Act for deepening, cleansing, and making more commodious the Harbours of the Town of Greenock, for supplying the Inhabitants with fresh and wholesome Water, and for paving, cleansing, lighting, and watching the streets and other public places within the said town,’—An Act passed in the 29th year of the reign of his Majesty King George the Third, entitled, ‘An Act for altering and enlarging the powers of an Act made in the 13th year of the reign of his present Majesty, entitled, ‘An Act for deepening, cleansing, and making more commodious the Harbours of the Town of Greenock, for supplying the Inhabitants with fresh and wholesome Water, and for paving, cleansing, lighting, and watching the streets and other public places within the said Town,’—An Act passed in the 41st year of the reign of His said Majesty, entitled, ‘An Act to amend two Acts made in the 13th and 29th years of the reign of his present Majesty, for making more commodious the Harbours of the Town of Greenock, and for other purposes mentioned in the said Acts, for watching the said Town and better supplying the same with Water: for regulating the fares of Coachmen, Chairmen, Porters, and Carters plying in the said Town, and of Pilots, Watermen and Jobbers employed in the said Harbours and on the River Clyde, and for feuing out the Glebe of the said Town,’—An Act passed in the 43d year of the reign of his said Majesty, entitled, ‘An Act for the further improvement of the Harbours of the Town of Greenock, and for other purposes therein mentioned,’—An Act passed in the 50th year of the reign of His said Majesty, entitled, ‘An Act for altering and enlarging the powers of several Acts of His present Majesty, for the Improvement of the Town of Greenock and the Harbours thereof; for regulating the Police, and for the other purposes mentioned in the said Acts,’—And an Act of the 57th year of the reign of his said Majesty, entitled, ‘An Act for the further Improvement of the Town and Harbours of Greenock, for establishing and supporting a Harbour Police, and for the better regulating the poor of the three parishes of Greenock.’—In which BILL it is intended to make provision for repealing, altering, amending, and enlarging the powers of the said several Acts, in so far as the same refer to the supplying the said Town with fresh and wholesome Water, and paving, cleansing, lighting, and watching the streets of the said Town, and Police thereof, and of the Harbours and Port of Greenock: and for including within the powers and provisions of the said intended Act, the limits and boundaries of the Burgh or Town of Greenock, as the same are set forth and contained in the Act 2d and 3d William Fourth, cap. 65, entitled ‘An Act to amend the representation of the people in Scotland’ and in the Schedule annexed thereto, referring to the said Burgh or Town; AND for power to collect and take water from the springs, rivulets, brooks and streams in the lands within six statute miles of the said Town of Greenock; and to erect reservoirs, cisterns, wells, and other works on such lands for the purpose of collecting the said Water, and to convey the same by means of pipes, sluices, conduits, aqueducts, or otherwise, into the said Town, and Harbours and Port of Greenock; AND ALSO, for approving and confirming a certain contract or agreement entered into between the Trustees acting under the said recited Acts, so far as the same refer to the supplying the Inhabitants of the said Town with pure and wholesome Water, and for paving, cleansing, lighting and watching the streets of the said Town, on the one part, and the Committee of Management of the Shaws Water Joint Stock Company, incorporated by Act of Parliament, on the other part, regarding the supply of a certain quantity of Water to the Inhabitants of the said Town, and the ships and vessels frequenting the said Harbours and Port of Greenock: AND for further powers for regulating the supply of Gas to the said Town and the Harbours and Port thereof, and in particular, for approving and confirming a certain contract or agreement made and entered into by and between the said Trustees on the one part, and the Provost, Bailies and Town Council of the said Town of Greenock, on the other part, in relation to the acquisition and establishment of the works and apparatus for the manufacture of Gas, and laying pipes for the supply of the same to the Inhabitants of the said Town: AND for the purposes aforesaid, to open up the roads, streets, squares, closes, and lanes of the said Town, and to lay pipes therein, in so far as not already done, and as may be deemed necessary and beneficial for the comfort of the said Inhabitants; and also for power to remove or repair, or cause to be removed or repaired, such ruinous houses and buildings, as from decay or otherwise, may be now, or may hereafter become, dangerous to the Inhabitants and persons frequenting the said Town, and for opening, widening, and straightening such of the streets, closes or lanes of the said Town, as may be found necessary or expedient, in particular for opening, widening, and otherwise improving the street or close called Taylor’s Close, and to widen and improve the communication between the same and the street called Hamilton Street in the said Town: and also for power to erect such additional market places and buildings connected therewith, and houses and offices for the use of the police and fire engine establishments of the said Town; and to make and order to be made such

causeways, pavements, sewers, and drains in the said Town, as may be found beneficial and necessary; and also for extending and enlarging the powers, and civil, criminal, and police jurisdiction of the Magistrates of the said Town: AND, generally, for more effectually maintaining and regulating the police of the said Town and Harbours and Port thereof, and for making such Bye Laws, rules and regulations for the good government and regulation of the said Town, and Police, and public Market places thereof, and of the said Harbours and Port, as may from time to time appear expedient—for power to take, acquire, and hold such lands and other hereditaments as may be necessary for any of the purposes aforesaid; and also for altering, varying, increasing, and extending the assessment and rates and duties authorised to be levied under the provisions of the said recited Acts, or any of them, in so far as the same refer to the supplying of the said Town with fresh and wholesome water, and paving, cleansing, lighting and watching the streets and the Harbours and Port thereof, and for levying new and additional Assessments, rates and duties in lieu thereof, and for borrowing such further additional sums of money, as may be necessary for any of the said purposes, and enabling bodies corporate and collegiate, and all other bodies or persons whatsoever, to lend upon the credit of the said rates and duties; and generally for such powers and authorities as may be necessary for all or any of the purposes aforesaid; AND in which said BILL it is further intended to make provision to enable the Provost, Bailies, and Town-Council of the said Town, to sell, transfer, or otherwise absolutely to dispose of the rates or duties heretofore in use to be levied by them from ships and vessels frequenting and using the said Harbours and Port of Greenock, to and in favour of the parliamentary trustees of the said Harbours and Port, and to enable such trustees to acquire, hold, and levy the same in all time coming: AND WHICH SAID TOWN, Harbours and Port, and the said intended works and brooks, streams, and rivulets, are and will be situated in the several Parishes of Greenock, viz., the Old or West, the New or Middle, the East, the North, the South, and St. Andrew’s, the Parishes of Innorkip, Kilmacolin, and Port-Glasgow, or some of them, all in the County of Renfrew.

HARBOUR OF ABERDEEN.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN,
