FOREIGN-OFFICE, February 25, 1842.

IT is hereby notified, that Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received, from the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the copy of a dispatch transmitted to their Lordships from Commander Ramsey, the Senior Officer in command of Her Majesty's Naval forces at Jamaica, enclosing a letter from Lieutenant de Courcy, commanding Her Majesty's brigantine Charybdis, dated the 31st of December 1841, from which it appears that the blockade of the port and harbour of Carthagen de Colombia by the forces of General Carmona has been raised.
