At the Court at Windsor Castle, 12th December 1844.

Chapter of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

A CHAPTER of this Most Noble Order having been summoned for this day, the Knights Companions hereafter named, in their mantles and collars, assembled in the Waterloo Gallery, viz.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge; the Duke of Rutland; the Duke of Wellington; the Marquess of Anglesea; the Marquess of Exeter; the Duke of Richmond; the Duke of Buccleuch; the Duke of Beaufort; the Duke of Buckingham and Chandos; the Marquess of Salisbury; and the Duke of Cleveland; attended by the following Officers, viz. the Lord Bishop of Winchester, Prelate; the Lord Bishop of Oxford, Chancellor; the Honourable and Reverend the Dean of Windsor, Register; Sir Charles George Young, Knight, Garter Principal King of Arms; and Sir Augustus William James Clifford, Bart. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod.

At three o'clock, the Knights Companions were called over by Garter, when (Her Majesty and the Prince Albert having passed into the Throne Room) they, together with the Officers of the Order, proceeded through the Grand Reception Room into the presence of the Sovereign.

The Sovereign being seated in Her chair of state, and His Royal Highness the Prince Albert at the table, on the right hand of Her Majesty, the other Knights Companions took their respective places at the table, the Prelate standing on the right hand, and the Chancellor on the left hand, of the Sovereign, the Register, Garter, and Black Rod, at the bottom of the table.

The Chancellor then, by command of Her Majesty, read a new statute, dispensing with the existing statutes, in as far as might be required for the especial purpose therein mentioned, and decreeing, ordaining, and enjoining, that His Royal Highness ERNEST THE SECOND, Reigning Duke of Saxe Coburg and Gotha (brother in law of Her Most Excellent Majesty the Queen), be declared a Knight of this Most Noble Order, any statute, decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

His Royal Highness the Prince Albert and His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, the two senior Knights Companions present, thereupon retired from the Chapter Room, when, by the Sovereign's command, the Reigning

Duke of Saxe Coburg and Gotha was conducted from the Grand Reception Room between their Royal Highnesses, preceded by Garter (bearing the ensigns of the Order upon a crimson velvet cushion) and by Black Rod.

On entering the Chapter Room, His Royal Highness was received by the Sovereign and the Knights Companions standing.

The Sovereign then announced to His Royal Highness, that he had been declared elected a Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Garter, kneeling, then presented the garter to the Sovereign, and Her Majesty, assisted by His Royal Highness the Prince Albert and His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, buckled it on the left leg of His Royal Highness the Duke of Saxe Coburg and Gotha, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition.

Garter next presented, in like manner, the ribband with the George, and the Sovereign, assisted as before, put the same over the left Shoulder of His Royal Highness, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition.

The Sovereign then gave the Accolade to the Reigning Duke, who afterwards, passing round the table, received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions present, and then took his seat in a chair of state, on the right hand of the Sovereign.

The Chancellor then signified to the Chapter, Her Majesty's royal will and pleasure, that the four vacant stalls in the Royal Chapel of Saint George, at Windsor, be filled; and as by the statutes none but a Knight can be elected, the Right Honourable Thomas Philip Earl De Grey was introduced by Garter and Black Rod, and knighted by Her Majesty with the sword of state, and his Lordship, having kissed the Sovereign's hand, retired; after which

The Most Honourable James Marquess of Abercorn and the Right Honourable Edward Earl of Powis were severally and successively introduced and knighted, with the same ceremonies.

The Knights Companions then proceeded to the election, and the suffrages having been collected by the Chancellor, were by him presented to the Sovereign, who commanded him to declare, and he accordingly declared that the Right Honourable Thomas Philip Earl de Grey had been duly elected a Knight Companion of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

Then, by the Sovereign's command, his Lordship was received at the door of the Chapter Room, by the Marquess of Salisbury and the Duke of Cleveland, the two junior Knights

Companions, and conducted between them to Her Majesty, preceded by Garter (bearing the ensigns upon a crimson velvet cushion) and by Black Rod. Earl De Grey, kneeling near the Sovereign, and Garter on his knee, presenting the garter, Her Majesty, assisted by his Royal Highness the Prince Albert and His Royal Highness the Duke of Cambridge, the two senior Knights Companions present, buckled it on his Lordship's left leg, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition.

Garter next presented, in like manner, the ribband and George, and Her Majesty, assisted as before, put the same over his Lordship's left shoulder, the Chancellor pronouncing the admonition. The Earl De Grey then again kissed the Sovereign's hand, and, having received the congratulations of each of the Knights Companions, retired.

The Chapter then proceeded to a second election, and the suffrages having been collected by the Chancellor, were presented to the Sovereign, when the Most Honourable James Marquess of Abercorn was, by the Sovereign's command, declared duly elected, and introduced; and, having been invested with the garter, and the ribband and George, with the like ceremonies, retired.

The Chapter then proceeded to a third election, and the suffrages having been collected and presented as before, the Right Honourable Charles Chetwynd Earl Talbot, late Knight of the Most Illustrious Order of St. Patrick (the ensigns of which he had, previously to the Chapter, surrendered to the Sovereign,) was, by the Sovereign's command, declared duly elected, and introduced; and, having been invested with the garter, and the ribband and George, with the same ceremonies, retired.

The Chapter then proceeded to a fourth election, and the suffrages having been collected and presented as before, the Right Honourable Edward Earl of Powis was, by the Sovereign's command, declared duly elected, and introduced; and, having been invested with the garter, and the ribband and George, with the same ceremonies, retired.

The Chapter being ended, Garter, by Her Majesty's command, again called over the Knights Companions, who, with the Officers of the Order, retired from the presence of the Sovereign, with the usual reverences.

The Queen, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by letters patent under Her Royal Sign-Manual and the Great Seal of the Order, bearing date this day, to dispense with all the statutes and regulations usually observed in regard to installation, and to

grant unto His Royal Highness Ernest the Second, Reigning Duke of Saxe Coburg and Gotha, &c. &c. &c. Knight of the said Most Noble Order, and duly invested with the ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the said Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if His Royal Highness had been formally installed, any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.

The Queen, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been graciously pleased, by letters patent under Her Royal Sign-Manual and the Great Seal of the Order, bearing date respectively this day, to dispense with all the statutes and regulations usually observed in regard to installation, and to give and grant unto the Right Honourable Thomas Philip Earl De Grey, the Most Honourable James Marquess of Abercorn, the Right Honourable Charles Chetwynd Earl Talbot, and the Right Honourable Edward Earl of Powis, Knights of the said Most Noble Order, and duly invested with the ensigns thereof, full power and authority to exercise respectively all rights and privileges belonging to a Knight Companion of the said Most Noble Order of the Garter, in as full and ample a manner as if they had been formally installed, any decree, rule, or usage to the contrary notwithstanding.
