THE GENERAL BOARD OF HEALTH.

ORDER SANCTIONING THE OPENING OF THE PORTSMOUTH, PORTSEA, AND GOSPORT HOSPITAL.

WHEREAS by the 8th Section of the "Nuisances Removal and Diseases Prevention Act, 1848," it is enacted, that "wherever it is intended to build or open any hospital for the reception of patients afflicted with contagious or infectious disorders, the trustees, or other persons by whose authority such hospital is intended so to be built or opened as aforesaid, shall give notice of such intention to the said General Board of Health, or (in Ireland) to the Commissioners of Health hereinafter mentioned; and no hospital shall be built or opened as aforesaid, until the said General Board of Health, or Commissioners of Health, as the case may be, have approved thereof, in writing," and in pursuance thereof, the trustees of the Portsmouth, Portsea, and Gosport Hospital, having made application to us, the General Board of Health, for our approval of the opening of the building recently erected and intended to be used for the above-named purposes, and we having instructed Mr Robert Rawlinson, one of our superintending inspectors, to examine the premises, and report to us upon the methods of drainage and ventilation adopted in these buildings, Mr Rawlinson has, in pursuance of these instructions, reported to us as follows:—

That "to make the present building as healthy as the situation will allow, it will be necessary to drain the whole of the site, to remove the cesspool to the furthest point of the ground—that it shall be made water-tight, and that tile drains, completely trapped, be laid from the building into it; and so soon as a general system of sewerage is carried out in the district, the cesspool shall be abolished, and the drains be laid into them. In the meantime, this cesspool will require constant attention, or it will be a nuisance to the hospital and the whole neighbourhood, though unfortunately, not greater than many now in existence. The 'wards' and 'water-closets' may, with advantage, have more ventilation provided, close to the ceiling of each room; and the bath-room ought to have both light and ventilation."

Now we, the General Board of Health, do hereby sanction the opening of the said hospital, but only to the extent and during the period that shall be from time to time certified to be necessary by one of our superintending inspectors, until the foresaid works shall be certified by such inspector

to have been executed in a complete and satisfactory manner.

TO THE GUARDIANS OF THE POOR OF THE UNION OF WHITECHAPEL, MIDDLESEX; AND TO ALL WHOM IT MAY CONCERN.

Whereas by the provisions of the "Nuisances Removal and Diseases Prevention Act, 1848," for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases, and by virtue of an order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 28th day of September 1848, directing that the said Act be put in force throughout the whole of Great Britain, we, the General Board of Health, are authorised to issue such directions and regulations as the said Board shall think fit, for the prevention, as far as possible, or mitigation of epidemic, endemic, or contagious diseases: And whereas by the said Act it is provided that the directions and regulations to be issued as aforesaid, shall extend to all parts or places in which the said provisions of the said Act shall for the time being be in force, under the order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, unless such directions or regulations shall be expressly confined to some of such parts or places, and then to such parts or places as in such directions and regulations shall be specified.

And whereas, in exercise of the authority vested in us as aforesaid, we have issued certain directions and regulations bearing date the 3d November 1848, to extend to England, and be enforced through that part of the United Kingdom; and whereas certain parts of the Whitechapel Union appear to be affected by formidable epidemic or endemic disease.

Now, in further exercise of the authority vested in us as aforesaid, we, the General Board of Health, do issue the directions and regulations hereinafter contained to extend to the Whitechapel Union.

1. That the Board of Guardians shall take the list directed by Order No. IX, bearing date November 3d, 1848, and shall appoint a sufficient number of medical officers to make house to house visitations of all streets, courts, alleys, or places

contained in such list, where diarrhoea, cholera, as well as typhus, scarlatina, and other epidemic diseases have heretofore prevailed.

2. That each medical officer shall visit the district assigned to him at least once in every twenty-four hours, and at such other times in the day as he may be directed, or find convenient; and that on such visits he shall inquire as to the instances of diarrhoea and other premonitory symptoms of cholera, as well as to the cases of typhus, scarlatina, or any other form of epidemic disease that may have occurred, and shall record and report the same.

3. That each such medical officer shall at all times carry with him medicines for the treatment of diarrhoea and premonitory symptoms of cholera, as well as of cholera itself, and shall on the spot administer the medicines, where he shall see occasion, to any person or persons whom he may find afflicted, and direct the further treatment of such person, either by removal to a room properly prepared for his reception, or by the administration of such cordials or nourishment as he, the medical officer, may deem necessary; and he shall, at the same time, take under the like charge all destitute persons whom he may find affected with typhus, scarlatina, and other epidemic diseases.

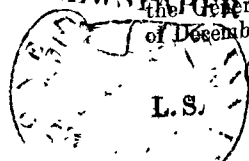
4. That each such medical officer shall immediately notify to contractors, scavengers, surveyors of highways, or other persons charged or chargeable with the cleansing of streets, courts, and alleys, and the removal of refuse therefrom, all cases where cleansing is required; and we do hereby order that all persons so chargeable with the works of cleansing within such district shall forthwith cleanse all such places, at such time and in such mode as the medical officer may deem requisite.

5. And we further authorise and require the Board of Guardians to provide rooms for the reception of the sick who cannot be properly treated at their own homes, and to furnish such rooms with the appliances which the medical officer may deem necessary for the due treatment of cholera; and we hereby direct that no such room shall contain at any one time more than four such persons.

6. And we do hereby authorise and require that the Guardians shall, in like manner, provide rooms for the reception of destitute persons living in filthy and over-crowded apartments, and in danger of being attacked by cholera, where such persons may remain until the danger of any attack of cholera shall appear to have passed, and their own homes shall have been duly purified and cleansed; and we direct that no such room shall contain, at any one time, more than four such persons.

7. And we hereby order each such medical officer to make a daily return to the clerk of the Union of the number of persons affected with premonitory symptoms, cholera, typhus, and any other epidemic diseases attended by him during the preceding twenty-four hours; and we order the clerk of the Union to forward a summary of such returns to the General Board of Health as early in the afternoon of each day as may be practicable.
