IT is hereby notified that Viscount Palmerston, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Mr Riddel, the British Acting Consul-General at Caracas, a Despatch dated the 12th of July last, reporting that a blockade of the coast of Coro, between the mouths of the rivers Yaracuy and Oribono, had been declared by the Government of Venezuela, and inclosing a copy of the Decree issued by that Government.

The following is a translation of the Decree :—

R publick of Venezuela.

JOSE TADEO MONAGAS,

General of Division, President of the Republic,
&c. &c. &c.

Considering ;

1st. That the first and most important of the attributes of the Executive power is to preserve internal order and tranquillity ;

2d. That the Ex-General José Antonio Paez, not yet satisfied with the tears and blood he has caused to be shed, has just disembarked at the Vela de Coro, with the view of renewing hostilities against the Republic, pretending, by his silly obstinacy in so criminal a design, to involve Venezuela in the calamities of another cruel and devastating war ; and,

3d. That under such circumstances the Government ought to hasten to dictate all such measures as may be within the sphere of its attributes, in order opportunely to obstruct the consequences of that invasion, to spare greater expense and sacrifices, and opportunely to bring back to their duties those who, departing therefrom a second time, shew themselves more hostile and stubborn ;

I Decree :

Art. 1st. The coast of the Province of Coro, extending from the disembogement of the river Yaracuy to the mouth of the river Oribono, is declared in a state of blockade.

Only Clause. A maritime division, at present composed of four armed vessels of war, the strength of which will be gradually augmented, will enforce the blockade.

Art. 2d. The vessels of war of friendly and neutral nations shall be allowed to enter into, depart from, and remain at the port of Vela de Coro, the Government being persuaded that they

will not in any manner aid the enemies of the Republick.

Art. 3d. For the penal effects of the blockade, eight days are fixed for the Island of Curacao and its dependencies St Thomas and Santa Cruz ; thirty days for vessels proceeding from Demerara and from the Antilles, not specified ; forty days for those proceeding from the United States of America ; and sixty days for those coming from European ports.

Only Clause. During the lapse of time specified in this Article, the blockading squadron will limit itself to making known the existence of the blockade to all merchant vessels proceeding from the said points, for which purpose it will note down this fact in the certificate of registry, or on the document which accredits the nationality or property of the visited vessel, and also that it has been duly notified of the existence of the said blockade ; and only in the event of attempting, after this Notification, to enter at any point comprised within the limits of the blockade, shall there be room for the detention and judgment of said vessel, in conformity with the laws and international right.

Art. 4th. The Secretary of State in the Departments of War and Marine is charged with the execution of this Decree.

WHEREAS by the Act 11th and 12th Victoria, cap. 123, intituled "An Act to renew and amend an Act of the tenth year of Her present Majesty, for the more speedy removal of certain nuisances, and the prevention of contagious and epidemic diseases," and by virtue of an Order of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 27th day of March 1849, directing that the provisions of the said Act be continued in force throughout the whole of Great Britain; We, the General Board of Health, are authorized to issue such Directions and Regulations as the said Board shall think fit, for the prevention, as far as possible, or mitigation of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases;

And whereas various parts within the Stepney Union appear to be affected by formidable epidemic and endemic disease,

We, the General Board of Health, do hereby, in further exercise of the power vested in us as aforesaid, issue the Directions and Regulations hereinafter contained, to extend to the Stepney Union:

1. That eight legally qualified medical men, or in case so many legally qualified medical men cannot be procured, advanced medical students, be forthwith appointed to aid in carrying out the system of house to house visitation, throughout the affected parts of the Union, or any other measures that it may be deemed advisable to adopt under the emergency.

2. That a house, or rooms be provided as a place or places of Refuge, in suitable positions, to which may be removed the families of such necessitous persons as have been attacked by Cholera, or others living near to persons so attacked; and that the houses or rooms from which persons may have been so removed, shall be thoroughly cleansed and purified by the owners, or those having the care thereof, or in their default, by the Guardians.

3. That hand-bills and notices be issued throughout the Union, and especially in the affected districts, giving full directions where medical aid and other assistance may be procured by those who may be attacked by Cholera, or any of its premonitory symptoms.

1. That three lay visitors be forthwith appointed, in addition to those previously appointed, to aid in carrying out an effective system of house to house visitation.

2. That a sufficient and adequate staff of men, with all proper materials, be kept in readiness, to carry out all works of lime washing, &c., in the cases of houses where Cholera has occurred, and in such other instances as the medical officers of the Parish shall direct.

3. That provision be forthwith made to secure additional supplies of water, to enable a complete and frequent washing of the Courts and other confined and close localities throughout the Parish.

Given under our hands, and under the seal of the General Board of Health, this thirty-first day of August one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine.

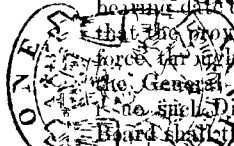

2. That a house or houses, or suitable rooms be forthwith prepared in wherever it may be deemed most convenient (being as near as practicable to the affected districts,) to serve as a House or Houses of Refuge, for the reception of the families of those who have been attacked by Cholera, and also of those necessitous persons living under the same roof, or in the immediate vicinity of those so attacked; and that the houses or rooms from which such persons have been so removed shall be

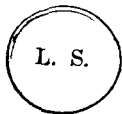

thoroughly cleansed and purified by the owners, or those having the care or ordering thereof, or in their default, by the Board of Guardians of the aforesaid Union.

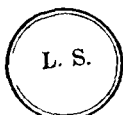
