Workington.

Limits of Ports and Legal Quays.

WE, the undersigned, being two of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in a Session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Customs," appoint Workington to be a port in that part of the United Kingdom called England; and we do hereby declare that the limits of the said port shall commence at a stream called Lowca Beck, at the point where it enters the sea south-south-west of the town of Workington, which stream separates the two parishes of Moresby and Harrington, and from thence along the coast to a stream called Canker Beck, on the north-east of the said town of Workington; and also that the limits of the port shall also extend to a distance of three miles from low water mark out to sea, and that such limits shall include all islands, bays, harbours, rivers, and creeks within the same respectively.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby appoint the following places, within the said port of Workington, to be legal quays for the lading and unlading of goods, and do hereby declare the bounds and limits of the said quays to be as follows; that is to say:—

All that open place, quay, or wharf, at Workington, called South Quay, being in length five hundred and seventy yards, and in breadth forty-eight feet.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, at the north end of the main pier of Workington, being sixteen yards in length, and in breadth fifty-eight feet.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, on the east side of the dock, at Workington aforesaid, being fifty-seven yards in length, and in breadth forty-six feet.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, on the south side of the said dock, being in length one hundred and forty-three yards, and in breadth fifteen yards.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, at Workington aforesaid, called the Jetty or New Quay, being fifty yards in length, and in breadth forty-eight feet.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, on the northern side of the harbour of Workington aforesaid, called Merchants' Quay, being four hundred and twenty yards in length, and in breadth sixty-two feet.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, at Workington aforesaid, on the north-east side of the river Derwent, being two hundred yards in length, and in breadth fifty feet.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, at Harrington, on the south side of the Outer Harbour there, being in length seventy-three yards, and in breadth eighty feet.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, at Harrington aforesaid, on the west end of the Inner Harbour, being in length thirty-six yards and in breadth thirty-three feet.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, at Harrington aforesaid, on the south side of the Inner Harbour, being in length one hundred and seventy-four yards, and in breadth twenty-one feet.

Also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, at Harrington aforesaid, on the north side of the Inner Harbour, being in length one hundred and twenty-eight yards, and in breadth forty feet.

Also all those two other open places, quays, or wharves, being the east and west side of that part of Harrington Harbour called the Tongue, of the length respectively of fifty-two yards, and in breadth respectively twenty-seven feet.

Limits of Port and Legal Quays.

We, the undersigned, being two of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Customs," appoint Whitehaven to be a port in that part of the United Kingdom called England; and we do hereby declare that the limits of the said port shall commence at the south side of Dudden Bridge, over

the River Dudden, and so continue down the river along the midstream thereof, and thence along the sea coast to a stream called Lowca Beck, which stream separates the two parishes of Moresby and Harrington; and also, that the limits of the said port shall extend to a distance of three miles from low-water mark out to sea, and include all islands, bays, rivers, harbours, and creeks, within the same respectively.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby appoint the following places within the said port of Whitehaven to be legal quays, for the lading and unlading of goods; and we do hereby declare the bounds and limits of the said quays to be as follow; that is to say:—

All that open place, quay, or wharf, on the east side of the north harbour of Whitehaven, leading to the north pier, being in length two hundred and ten yards, and in breadth thirty-one feet.

Also all that open place, quay, or wharf, at the north end of the said harbour, being in length ninety yards, and in breadth thirty-three feet.

Also all that open place, quay, or wharf, called the Jetty, on the east side of the said harbour, which said quay or wharf extends in length sixty yards, and in breadth forty-six feet.

Also all that open place, quay, or wharf, on the western side of the said harbour, called the Bulwark, being in length two hundred and ten yards, and in breadth thirty-one feet

Also all that open place, quay, or wharf, at the south end of the south harbour, called the Old Quay, being in length, from the corner opposite to the baths to the eastern extremity thereof, two hundred and forty yards, and in breadth twenty-six feet.

Also all that open place, quay, or wharf, called West Strand Quay, commencing at the west end of the last-mentioned quay, and thence along the West Strand till it adjoins the Custom-House Quay, and being in length two hundred and ten yards, and in breadth thirty-seven feet.
