## Plymouth.—Legal Quays.

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint the following places, within the Port of Plymouth, to be legal quays for the lading and unlading of goods, and we do hereby declare the bounds and extents of such quays to be as follows; that is to say: All that quay or wharf, at Plymouth, called the Millbay Pier, situate at the entrance of Millbay, and about four hundred and fifty yards seaward of the outward wall of the Plymouth Great Western Dock, now in course of construction, and being in length four hundred and seventy-five feet, and in breadth, for landing purposes, forty-five feet.

And also all that other quay or wharf, at Plymouth, adjoining the eastern end of Millbay

Pier aforesaid, and situate on the north side thereof, called the Pier Wharf, being in length three hundred and fifty-five feet, extending northward from the side of the Pier to the northern end of the railroad draw-bridge over the entrance into Gill's stone dock and wharf, and in breadth, for landing purposes, about fifty-five feet.

A PROCLAMATION.

CLARENDON.

WHEREAS in pursuance and execution of an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the better prevention of Crime and Outrage in certain parts of Ireland, until the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and to the end of the then next Session of Parliament, We did, by Our three several Proclamations, bearing date respectively the eighteenth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, declare, that from and after the twentieth day of the said month of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, the said Act should apply to and be in force in the county of the city of Cork, the county of Dublin, and the county of the city of Dublin.



And whereas by one other Proclamation, in execution of the said Act, bearing date the thirty-first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, We did declare, that from and after the second day of August then next ensuing, the said Act should apply to and be in force in the county of the town of Galway.

And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said several Proclamations of the eighteenth and thirty-first of July aforesaid.

Now We, the Lord Lieutenant, do by this Our Proclamation, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council in Ireland, declare that from and after the date hereof, the said several Proclamations shall stand and be revoked.

And of this Our Proclamation all Justices of the Peace of the said counties, and counties of cities and towns, Constables, Peace Officers, and all others whom it may concern, are to take notice.
