HER Majesty in Council was this day pleased, upon the representation of the Committee of Council on Education, to appoint Dr James Cumming, L.L.D., Rector of the Academy at Glasgow, to be one of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools in Scotland, in the room of John Gibson, Esq. resigned.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the appointment of convenient places for the holding of assizes in England and Wales," it was declared and enacted that His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, should have power, from time to time, to order and direct at what place or places in any county in England or Wales the assizes and sessions under the commissions of gaol delivery, and other commissions for the despatch of civil and criminal business, shall be holden:

Now therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby, under and in pursuance of the said Act, order and direct that the assizes and sessions under the commissions of gaol delivery, and other commissions for the despatch of civil and criminal business which shall be holden in and for the county of Berks next after the date of this Order, shall be held at Abingdon, in the said county, and not at Reading, or at any other place within the said county.

And the Right Honourable the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The Queen has been pleased to grant unto John Charles Gawen Roberts, Esq. a Retired Rear-Admiral in Her Majesty's Navy, eldest and only surviving son and heir of William Roberts, Esq. sometime a Captain in the 2d Regiment of Dragoon Guards, by Sarah his wife, daughter of Jeffery Gawen, of the city of Salisbury, Esq. and sister and heir of Jeffery Gawen, a Commander in the Royal Navy, all deceased, Her royal licence and authority that he and his issue may henceforth take and use the surname of Gawen, in addition to and after that of Roberts, and bear the arms of Gawen quarterly with those of Roberts; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Herald's Office, otherwise the said licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And to command that the said royal concession and declaration be registered in Her Majesty's College of Arms.
