The Noblemen and Gentlemen who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levees at St James's-Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presence-chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, on the *Mondays previous* to the Levees on 26th February instant and 26th March next, and on the *Tuesday previous* to the Levee on 6th March next, on each day *before twelve o'clock*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall be made at the Levees but in conformity with the above Regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The State Apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court until half-past one o'clock.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having Petitions or Addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levees, are to send a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come) to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *before twelve o'clock*, on the *Mondays previous* to the Levees on 26th February instant and 26th March next, and on the

WINDSOR-CASTLE, February 11, 1861.

This day a Deputation of Protestant Dissenting Ministers, of the Three Denominations, waited upon Her Majesty with the following Address:—

To The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

We, your Majesty's faithful subjects, the Protestant Dissenting Ministers of the three denominations in and about the cities of London and Westminster, desire to approach your Majesty with the assurance of our true-hearted attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person and Government.

We would humbly represent to your Majesty our conviction that we are indebted, under God, for our national prosperity and greatness, and especially for our civil and religious liberties, to those principles of the Protestant Reformation which placed your Majesty's ancestors of the illustrious House of Brunswick on the Throne, and that we must ever look to the maintenance of these principles for the preservation of the just prerogatives of the Crown and for the constitutional rights and social happiness of the people. We therefore feel ourselves called upon, by imperative obligation, to denounce the recent claim of the Pope to exercise jurisdiction in your Majesty's Realm, as an arrogant assumption of power incompatible with national independence, and alike inimical to the authority of the Monarch and the freedom of the Subject.

Warned by the past history of Popery, as well as by the condition of those countries where it is still in power, we cannot but look with apprehension upon the boldness with which the Pope has felt himself encouraged to take a step unprecedented in this country since the time of the Reformation, since it indicates the existence of hopes and schemes which, should they be realized, would prove fatal to all that is dear to us both as Englishmen and Christians; we cannot therefore refrain from expressing to your Majesty the deep regret with which we look upon the causes which have conduced to the recent measure, as they may, some of them, be found in the legislative patronage of Popery, and some in the anti-protestant teaching and practices which of late years have so extensively prevailed in the Established Church.

While we desire in no way to infringe upon the religious liberty of Roman Catholics, and would humbly state to your Majesty our unabated claim of the rights of conscience both for them and for ourselves, and for all your Majesty's subjects, we do not consider that these rights would be impaired by your Majesty's disallowance of the territorial titles and jurisdiction conferred by the Pope; and for the development of Popery to be only so far legally permitted as is plainly compatible with the security of the Throne and the liberties of the Subject.

We desire to be allowed, in conclusion, to assure your Majesty that we are animated by the same spirit of ardent attachment to the Civil Constitution of our Country, and of loyalty to the Throne, which have ever distinguished Protestant Nonconformists; and while we devoutly thank God for all the bounties which His Providence has bestowed upon us under your Majesty's auspicious reign, we offer to Him our fervent prayers that your Majesty, with your Royal Consort, and your illustrious family, may possess every domestic and public—every temporal and spiritual blessing,—and that, in length, through the grace of our only Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, when your Majesty shall resign an earthly Crown, it may be

to receive a Heavenly Diadem, and to reign in God's celestial Kingdom for ever.

Limits of Port and Legal Quay.

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint Truro to be a Port in that part of the United Kingdom called England, and we do hereby declare that the limits of the said Port shall extend from the Quay of Truro, down the Truro River to a point called Messick Point, on the east side of the said river, and thence in a direct line across to the north end of Mylor Church, on the south-west side of the river or harbour, opposite to the said Point, and including all bays, harbours, rivers, creeks, pills, and islands, within the said limits.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners, do hereby appoint the following place within the said Port of Truro, to be a legal quay for the lading



and unloading of goods, and do hereby declare the bounds and limits of the said quay to be as follows ; that is to say :

All that open place or quay called the Corporation Quay, extending from the bridge erected over the Saint Alan River, called Boscawen Bridge, southwards along the south-east side thereof, to the south-east point or head of the quay, three hundred and fifty-one feet or thereabouts, and from the said south-east point, extending northwards along the north-west side thereof, two hundred and forty-three feet or thereabouts, to the property leased off the Corporation by John Devonshire and others, and in breadth, from the north-east to the south-west side, two hundred feet or thereabouts, at the broadest part, and twenty-five feet or thereabouts, at the narrowest part.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners, do hereby annul all former limits of the said Port of Truro, and all former legal quays already set out and appointed within the same.

Port of Falmouth.

Limits of Port and Legal Quays.

We, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the Session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint Falmouth to be a Port in that part of the United Kingdom called England, and we do hereby declare that the limits of the said Port shall extend from the western side of the Dodman Point, being the western boundary of the Port of Fowey, along the coast of the county of Cornwall, and up the eastern side of the Harbour of Falmouth until a direct line can be drawn from Messick Point to the north end of Mylor Church, on the south-west side of the river or harbour opposite to the said Point, being the southern boundary of the Port of Truro, and thence proceeding along the said coast to the eastern side of the Lizard Point, being the eastern boundary of the Port of Penzance, and extending seaward to the distance of three miles from every part of the said coast, within the said limits, and including all bays, harbours, creeks, rivers, and islands within such limits ; and we, the said Lords Commissioners, do hereby appoint the following places within the said Port of Falmouth to be legal quays for the lading and unloading of goods, and do hereby declare the bounds and limits of the said quays to be as follows ; that is to say, all that open place, quay, or wharf, called the Middle Quay of Falmouth, extending southwardly, in length from the western corner of the basin to the southern corner thereof, 209 feet, or thereabouts, and in breadth from the edge of the said quay, 64 feet or thereabouts. Also, all that other open place, quay, or wharf, called the South Quay of Falmouth, adjoining the south end of the aforesaid quay, called the Middle Quay, and extending from thence eastward towards the head of the said South Quay, in length 194 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth at the west end, 62 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth at the eastern head or end, 43 feet, or thereabouts, and also one arm or wing at the eastern end of the said South Quay, ex-

tending itself from the body of the said quay northward, in length 126 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth 15 feet or thereabouts. And also all that other open place, quay, or wharf, called the North Quay of Falmouth, extending northerly, in length from the north end of the old Custom House, 94 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth 60 feet or thereabouts ; and also those arms or wings at the northern head or end of the said North Quay, extending in length from north to south, 259 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth 26 feet or thereabouts ; and also all that open place, quay, or wharf, called the Exchequer Quay, at Penryn, adjoining the Bridge-road, containing in length from the aforesaid road eastward towards the head or end thereof, 175 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth at the said head or end thereof, 108 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth at the west angle of the said quay, adjoining the Bridge-road aforesaid, 166 feet or thereabouts ; also all that open place, quay, or wharf, called Treath Quay, situate on the south side of Helford river, and opposite Helford Passage, containing in length, from the eastern end towards the head thereof, 152 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth at the said eastern end, 48 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth opposite the eastern warehouse, 81 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth at the west angle of the said quay, 113 feet or thereabouts ; also one arm or wing at the north-west end of the said last-mentioned quay, extending itself from the body of the said quay westward, in length 40 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth at the east angle of the said pier, 18 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth at the head or end of the said arm or wing, 10 feet or thereabouts ; and also one other arm or wing at the south-west end of the said last-mentioned quay westward, 50 feet or thereabouts, and containing in breadth at the eastern angle of the aforesaid pier, 25 feet or thereabouts, and in breadth at the head or end of the said arm or wing, 33 feet or thereabouts. And we, the said Lords Commissioners, do hereby annul all former limits of the said port of Falmouth, and all former legal quays already set out and appointed within the same.
