REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING-ROOMS.

The Ladies who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Rooms are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *legibly* written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presence Chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

And those Ladies who are to be presented are hereby informed it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the names of the Ladies who are to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office on the second day previous to the Drawing-Rooms (*for that announced for the 6th of May on Saturday the 3d of May*), before twelve o'clock, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command that no presentation shall take place unless the name of the Lady presenting, together with that of the Lady to be presented, shall appear on the card to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, which names shall correspond with those previously sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested that in every case *written cards only* be delivered.

Notice is hereby given, that the carriages proceeding to Her Majesty's Drawing-Room on Tuesday the 6th of May, are to fall into line

and come down the left-hand side of St James's-Street, enter at the iron gate nearest the Palace, set down at the Arcade, turn round, and go out by the iron gate nearest Marlborough House, to wait in St James's Square. When called, they are to pass from the Square through Charles Street, into Regent Street and Jermyn Street, come down St James's Street as before, take up, and go away through Pall Mall.

No hackney carriages will be admitted within the gates.

For all persons having the privilege of the *entree*, tickets will be delivered at the Board of Green Cloth, on Saturday next, from eleven till three o'clock : their carriages are to pass through Constitution Hill Gate, into St James's Park : those belonging to the Ambassadors and Foreign Ministers are to set down at the Ambassadors' Entrance in Marlborough Court, at the east end of St James's Palace, and wait there till called : those belonging to the Cabinet Ministers and Great Officers of State are to set down in the Middle Court, and wait there : the carriages of all other persons having the *entree* are likewise to set down in the Middle Court, and wait in the Stable Yard, or St James's Park, till called : they are then to take up in the same order as they had set down, and pass away up St James's Street.

No carriage will be admitted with company a second time with the same ticket ; to prevent which, it must be produced at Constitution Hill Gate, and Stable Yard Gate also, where a corner of it will be torn off by the Marshalmen in attendance ; and no person can be allowed the privilege of the *entree* by any other approach to the Palace than as above directed.

Whereas in pursuance and execution of an Act passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the better prevention of Crime and Outrage in certain parts of Ireland, until the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and forty-nine, and to the end of the then next Session of Parliament," We did, by our four several Proclamations, bearing date respectively the twenty-third day of December, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven; the eighteenth, the twenty-second, and thirty-first days of July, one thousand eight hundred and forty-eight, declare that from and after the dates in said Proclamations respectively mentioned, the said Act should apply to and be in force in the barony of Orrery and Kilmore, the baronies of Cork, Fermoy, and Condons and Clongibbon, Kerri-currihy, Kinsale, Kinalea, Courcies, Kinalmeaky, Barretts North, Barretts South, Barrymore, Kinatalloon, Imokilly, East Muskerry, East Carberry, Ibane and Barryroe, Duhallow, West Muskerry, West Carberry, Bantry, and Bear, all in the County of Cork.

And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said several Proclamations of the twenty-third day of

December, and eighteenth, twenty-second, and thirty-first of July aforesaid:

Now We, the Lord Lieutenant, do, by this our Proclamation, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Privy Council in Ireland, declare that from and after the date hereof the said several Proclamations shall stand and be revoked.

CLARENDON.

Whereas by an Act passed in the 12th and 13th year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to make provision during the present year, and to the end of the year 1851, relating to the Collection of County Cess in Ireland, and to the remuneration of the Collectors thereof," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief-Governor or Governors of Ireland, by any Order to be published in the Dublin Gazette, from time to time to Order and declare that in and for any county or barony in such Order specified, the provisions therein contained, relative to the security to be given by any High Constable or Collector of Grand Jury Cess, for the due collection of the same, shall be in force during the then current year.

Now We, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, do hereby, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the said recited Act, Order and declare that in and for the barony of Ida, in the county of Kilkenny, the provision in the said recited Act contained relative to the security to be given by any High Constable or Collector of Grand Jury Cess, for the due collection of the same, shall be in force during the now current year.
