## REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S LEVEE, AT ST JAMES'S-PALACE.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Levee at St James's Palace are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names *clearly written* thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presence Chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

Those Gentlemen who are to be presented are hereby informed it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, on *Monday, 26th May*, before twelve o'clock, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall be made at the Levees but in conformity with the above Regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be *very distinctly written* upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in

order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to the Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court until half-past one o'clock.

Some irregularities having taken place, notice is hereby given, that no Officer of the Army or Navy, nor any Civilian, to be presented to the Queen at the Levee, can be admitted to the State apartments for that purpose, whose presentation card has not been previously sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office according to the above Regulations.

The name of any Gentleman not adhering to the Regulation must be excluded from the presentation book, and the reason entered for so doing; viz.—The contravention of the Regulations.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having Petitions or Addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levee, are to send a card (having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come,) to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, *on Monday, 26th May*, before twelve o'clock; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Levee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Ante-Room, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

## NOTICE.

We, the undersigned, being two of the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, in exercise of the power vested in us by "The Passengers' Act, 1849," and by an Act passed in the present year, intituled "An Act to amend the Passengers' Act, 1849," and acting in this behalf under the authority of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, do hereby give notice that from the 1st day of June 1851, the following articles of food, and in the following proportions, may be supplied by the Master of any passenger ship, by way of substitutes for the articles of food required by the said Passengers' Act, 1849, to be issued to passengers, that is to say,—potatoes, beef, or pork, preserved meat, dried salt fish, bread, biscuit, or best wheaten flour, or split peas, may be substituted for oatmeal or rice, at the rate of  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. of beef, pork, or preserved meat, or  $\frac{3}{4}$  lb. of dried salt fish, or 1 lb. of bread or biscuit, or 1 lb. of best wheaten flour, or 1 lb. of split peas, for  $1\frac{1}{2}$  lb. of oatmeal, or for 1 lb. of rice.

Preserved potatoes may be substituted for potatoes, at the rate of  $\frac{1}{4}$  lb. of preserved potatoes for 1 lb. of potatoes.

Sugar may be substituted for molasses, at the rate of  $\frac{1}{4}$  lb. of sugar for  $\frac{1}{2}$  lb. of molasses.

Coffee or cocoa may be substituted for tea, at the rate of 4 oz. of coffee or cocoa for 2 oz. of tea.

And in exercise of the power vested in us by the 47th Section of the said Passengers' Act, 1849, we hereby also give notice, that the following shall, from the 1st of June 1851, be the form of contract ticket required by the said Act, with respect to passages to North America.

## NOTICES TO PASSENGERS.

1. If the ship do not proceed to sea on the day specified above, Passengers, if ready to go on board and proceed in the vessel, are entitled to subsistence-money at the rate of one shilling a day per Statute Adult, (each person over fourteen, or two children between one and fourteen years of age, being reckoned as a Statute Adult,) for each day of delay until the actual clearing out and final departure of the ship; but if the Passengers are lodged and maintained in any establishment under the superintendence of the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, the shilling a day is payable to the Emigration Officer at the port of embarkation. In either case the money may be recovered by summary process before two magistrates. If, however, the delay arises from unavoidable detention by wind or weather, and if the Passengers be maintained on board in the same manner as if the voyage had commenced, no subsistence-money is payable.

2. If Passengers fail to obtain a passage in the ship according to their contract, either from her having sailed before the appointed time, or from there being no room in her, or through any default of the owner, charterer, or master, and are not within forty-eight hours provided with a passage in some other equally eligible ship to the same port, then they are entitled to a return of their passage-money, and to such compensation, not exceeding £10, as the Justices may award.

3. Passengers should not rely only on the provisions which the master of the ship is bound to issue to them, but should take an extra supply with them.

4. Passengers should carefully keep this part of their Contract Ticket till after the end of the voyage.

**N.B.—This Contract Ticket is exempt from Stamp Duty.**

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas there was this day read at the Board a Report from the General Board of Health, dated the thirtieth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, in the words following ; that is to say :—

“To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

“We, the General Board of Health, appointed for the purposes of the Public Health Act, 1848, have in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon the petition of not less than one-tenth of the inhabitants rated to the relief of the poor of and within the parish of Towyn, situate in the county of Merioneth, North Wales, (the number of the said petitioners greatly exceeding thirty in the whole,) directed George Thomas Clark, a Superintending Inspector appointed for the purposes of the said Public Health Act, to visit the said parish, and to make public inquiry, and to examine witnesses as to the sewerage, drainage, and supply of water, the state of the burial-grounds, the number and sanitary condition of the inhabitants, and as to any local Acts of Parliament in force within such parish for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving the said parish, or having relation to the purposes of the said Public Health Act ; also as to the natural drainage, areas, and the existing municipal, parochial, or other local boundaries, and the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of that Act ;

“And the said Superintending Inspector having previously given the notices directed by the said Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said inquiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath reported in writing to the said Board upon the said several matters with respect to which he was directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters with respect to which he deemed it expedient to report for the purposes of that Act ;

“And copies of the said Report, accompanied by a notice, stating that written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in or omitted from the said Report, or any amendment proposed to be made therein, have been duly published and deposited as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed ;

“And it appears by the said Report that there is no local Act of Parliament in force within the said parish for paving, lighting (otherwise than for the profit of proprietors or shareholders), cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving such parish, or any part thereof, or in anywise relating to the purposes of the said Public Health Act ;

“Now therefore, We, the said General Board of Health, do hereby, in pursuance of the said Public Health Act, humbly report to your Majesty that it appears to us to be expedient :

“1. That the Public Health Act, 1848, and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act, printed by your Majesty's printers, should be applied to, and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places comprised within the boundaries of the said parish, and that such area, places, and parts of places should be and constitute a district for the purpose of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

“2. That the Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act shall consist of twelve persons, and that the entire number shall be elected for the whole of the said district.

“3. That the first election of the said Local Board of Health shall take place on the twenty-sixth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one.

“4. That one-third in number of the said Local Board of Health shall go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year subsequently to that in which the said first election of that Local Board takes place ; but in case the day so appointed shall fall on a Sunday, or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then such one-third shall go out of office on the day next following.

“5. That every person at the time of his election as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, be resident, as in the said Public Health Act, 1848, is required, and be seized or possessed of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or amount of not less than five hundred pounds ; or shall be so resident and rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than fifteen pounds.

“6. That at the first election of the said Local Board, the Reverend Owen Jones, Vicar of Towyn aforesaid, shall have the powers and perform the duties vested in or imposed upon the Chairman of the Local Board of Health by the Public Health Act 1848, in relation to the election by owners of property and rate-payers, and shall perform all other duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting and completing the said first election ; and in case the said Owen Jones shall, from illness, or other sufficient cause, be unable to exercise or discharge such powers or duties, or shall be absent, or shall refuse to act, then John Pughe, Esquire, Surgeon, of Penhelig, Aberdovey, within the said district, shall exercise and perform such of the said powers and duties as then remain to be exercised or performed.

“7. That the fourteen days' notice of qualification required by the Public Health Act, 1848, to be given by owners of property, in order to entitle them to vote at the said first election, shall be given to the said Owen Jones, at his residence, the Vicarage, situate within the aforesaid district of Towyn ; or in case he shall refuse, or be unable to receive the same, then to the said John Pughe, at his residence, Penhelig, Aberdovey, likewise within the district of Towyn aforesaid.

Now therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said Report into consideration, is pleased to approve thereof, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, doth hereby, under and in pursuance of the Public Health Act, 1848, order and direct,

1. That from and after the date of this Order, the said Public Health Act, and every part thereof, except the section numbered 50 in the copies of that Act, printed by Her Majesty's printers, shall be applied to and be in force within and throughout the entire area, places, and parts of places com-

prised within the boundaries of the parish of Towyn, in the county of Merioneth, North Wales, and that such area, places, and parts of places shall be and constitute a district for the purposes of the said Public Health Act accordingly.

2. That the Local Board of Health to be elected under the said Public Health Act, shall consist of twelve persons, and that the entire number shall be elected for the whole of the said district.

3. That the first election of the said Local Board of Health shall take place on the twenty-sixth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one.

4. That one-third in number of the said Local Board of Health, shall go out of office on the thirty-first day of March in each year subsequently to that in which the first election of that Local Board takes place; but in case the day so appointed shall fall on a Sunday or on a day appointed for public fast or thanksgiving, then such one-third shall go out of office on the day next following.

5. That every person, at the time of his election, as member of the said Local Board, and so long as he shall continue in office by virtue of such election, be resident, as in the said Public Health Act, 1848, is required, and be seized or possessed of real or personal estate, or both, to the value or amount of not less than five hundred pounds; or shall be so resident and rated to the relief of the poor of some parish, township, or place, of which some part is within the said district, upon an annual value of not less than fifteen pounds.

6. That at the first election of the said Local Board, the Reverend Owen Jones, Vicar of Towyn aforesaid, shall have the powers and perform the duties vested in or imposed upon the Chairman of the Local Board of Health by the Public Health Act, 1848, in relation to the election by owners of property and rate-payers, and shall perform all other duties which it may be requisite for him to perform in conducting and completing the said first election; and in case the said Owen Jones shall, from illness or other sufficient cause, be unable to exercise or discharge such powers or duties, or shall be absent, or shall refuse to act, then John Pughe, Esquire, Surgeon, of Penhelig, Aberdovey, within the said district, shall exercise and perform such of the said powers and duties as then remain to be exercised or performed.

7. That the fourteen days' notice of qualification required by the Public Health Act, 1848, to be given by owners of property in order to entitle them to vote at the said first election, shall be given to the said Owen Jones, at his residence, the Vicarage, situate within the aforesaid district of Towyn; or in case he shall refuse or be unable to receive the same, then to the said John Pughe, at his residence, Penhelig, Aberdovey, likewise within the district of Towyn aforesaid.
