Her Majesty in Council was this day pleased to appoint the Right Honourable the Lord President of the Council for the time being; the Most Honourable the Marquis of Salisbury, Lord Keeper of the Privy Seal; the Most Noble the Duke of Northumberland, First Lord Commissioner of the Admiralty; the Right Honourable the Earl of Derby, First Lord Commissioner of Her Majesty's Treasury; the Right Honourable John James Robert Manners (commonly called Lord John Manners), First Commissioner of Works and Buildings; the Right Honourable Spencer Horatio Walpole, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; the Right Honourable Benjamin Disraeli, Chancellor and Under Treasurer of Her Majesty's Exchequer; and the Right Honourable Joseph Warner Henley, President of the Committee of Council for Trade, to be a Committee to superintend the application of any sums voted by Parliament for the purpose of promoting public education.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

Whereas by an Act passed in the fifty-sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to provide for a new silver coinage, and to regulate the currency of the gold and silver coin of this Realm," the Master and Worker of Our Mint in London was authorized and empowered to coin, or cause to be coined, silver bullion into silver coins, consisting of crowns, half-crowns, shillings, and sixpences, of the standard of eleven ounces and two pennyweights of fine silver and eighteen pennyweights of alloy to the pound troy; and in weight after the rate of thirty-six shillings to the pound troy: And whereas, by an Act passed in the twelfth and thirteenth year of Our reign, intituled "An Act to extend an Act of the fifty-sixth year of King George the Third, for providing for a new silver coinage, and for regulating the currency of the gold and silver coin of this Realm," the Master and Worker of Our Mint in London was authorized and empowered to coin, or cause to be coined, silver bullion into silver coins of the standard of fineness above mentioned, and in weight after the rate of sixty-six shillings to every pound troy, whether the same be coined in crowns, or in any pieces of a lower denomination: And whereas, in the thirteenth year of Our reign, We thought fit to order that certain pieces of silver money should be coined, to be called Florins or tenths of a pound, and to be of the value of two shillings: And whereas, pursuant to Our said Order, and in virtue of the power given by the said recited Act, a coinage of the said florins or tenths of a pound, of the standard and at the rate aforesaid, was made: And whereas, pursuant to Our further orders, and in virtue of the said power, a new coinage of florins or tenths of a pound, of the standard and at the rate aforesaid, has been made, and every florin or one-tenth of a pound, in such new coinage, has for the obverse Our effigy crowned, with the inscription "Victoria D.G.: Brit: Reg. F.D.:" and the date of the year: and for the reverse, the ensigns armorial of the United Kingdom, contained in four shields, cross-wise, each shield surmounted by the royal crown, with the rose in the centre, and in the compartments between the shields the National emblems of the rose, thistle, and shamrock, surmounted by

the words "One Florin One-Tenth of a Pound," and with a milled graining round the edge : And whereas pieces of silver money of the description last-mentioned have been coined at Our Mint, and will be coined there in pursuance of orders issued and to be issued by Us : We have therefore, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation ; and we do hereby ordain, declare, and command, that the said last-mentioned pieces of money so coined and to be coined shall be current and lawful money of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful money of Our said Kingdom by the names aforesaid, and at the value hereinbefore assigned to them.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham-Palace, this fifth day of April, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and in the fifteenth year of Our reign.

GOD save the QUEEN.
